Union Schools Election June 16

The district boundary board has set June 16 as the date for voting on petitions seeking consolidation of Oaklawn and Monte Cristo districts in Clackamas county and Monitor, Harmony and Grassy Pond school districts in Marion county.

Mrs. Agnes Booth, county superintendent, stated that some of the schools are becoming overcrowded in the area and need for new buildings becoming imperative and the petitioners desired to test out the consolidated vote before going ahead to meet the necessities looming in the individual districts.

The board also has a meeting slated for next Tuesday on petitions seeking to transfer some of the territory in the Aumsville district over into the Sublimity district. Substantially the same proposition came to a hearing before the board several months ago but was not approved.

Ammonia

Kennewick, May 29 (AP)—A condition of emergency was declared in Kennewick at a special meeting of the city council last night, as Red Cross and national guard troops stood by for additional evacuees from low-lying areas along the Columbia river.

State highway 410 is closed west of Kennewick and traffic is being re-routed over Highland and Sonderman roads.

The water system in Kennewick is endangered as the city water pumping plant operated by the Kennewick irrigation district cannot be raised and may be put out of operation by rising waters.

Residents of Pasco and Kennewick are boiling drinking water now.

Navy Changing to Meet New Needs

Annapolis, May 29 (AP)—"The navy is changing physically almost as greatly as it did in the change from sail to steam," Under Secretary for Air John M. Brown said today.

Brown told the post-graduate class at the United States naval academy, that critical problems today challenge the ingenuity of naval technicians.

"The implements of naval warfare are in a fluid state," Brown said. "Great changes are taking place in aircraft, ships and ordnance."

"We are at a point at which the weapons of the last war begin to be supplanted by others embodying the lessons which the last war taught," he added that these changes are being brought about largely by engineers.
