The local group also is making plans for a regional meeting to be in Seattle, October 16 and 17.

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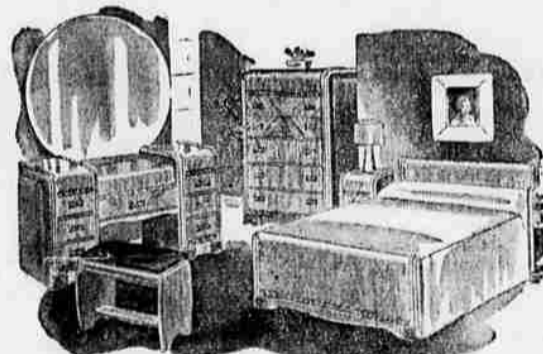
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
