## Citation's Bid In Empire Race Reduces Entries

New York, Oct. 15 (AP)—Entries closed today for the Empire City Gold cup, and thanks to Citation, it looks like a small field of six horses for the \$100,000 international gallop.

The second running of the mile and five furlong classic is set for tomorrow at Belmont Park. Two European horses and three from this country probably will oppose the great Calumet Farm triple crown champion.

Nathoo, a gray English three-year-old owned by the Aga Khan, is a definite starter among the foreign contenders. Final word is expected during the day on the Belgian champion, Bayeux.

Other American horses besides Citation are Phalanx, Miss Grillo, and Drumbeat, with a remote possibility Conover might get another chance.

Final verdict on Bayeux, which suffered bruised hocks during his plane ride from Brussels earlier this week, will be given another light workout.

The veteran Chicago golfer came in with a sizzling six-under-par 66 yesterday to move two strokes in front of Bulla, Phoenix, Ariz. A field of 150 of the nation's top pro and amateur linksmen trailed the leaders.

There'll be a top brand of football on display Friday night at Sweetland field when Salem high's victory hungry Vikings get down to business with Springfield's Millers.

The Viks are primed to reverse their 1948 record when they take to the field at 8 p.m., but improvement, too, and the Springfielders have as much at stake in the game as the Salem team.

Coach Loren Mort, whose team, even in defeat, has shown a tenacious defense, has worked the crew this week to polish an offense for the Springfield game.

The game Friday night, while strictly a cellar club affair of the Big Six league, is expected to show two improved and determined clubs to Sweetland field fans.

It will be the Vikings' second home game of the 1948 season. Salem opened its schedule in September with a loss to Vancouver, Wash., on the local grid.

Albany's Bulldogs, aiming for the state playoffs again this year, will run up against central Oregon's top team, the Bend Lava Bears, an Associated Press report said.

The undefeated, untied teams will be battling for the lead of the Big Six league—and to stay in the select circle of clubs with unblemished records.

Only four others still have perfect records, and they face easy tasks this week-end. Grants Pass will be host to off-walloped Ashland. Hillsboro will take on a Forest Grove team that has yet to win.

The two unbeaten, untied Portland teams are expected to win handily, Jefferson over Washington and Roosevelt over Cleveland.

Southern Oregon also will see an important district 2 game as the strong Klamath Falls team travels to play powerful Medford.

In other games featuring district leaders The Dalles will vie with Battleground, Wash.; Gresham will play Oregon City; and Scappoose will tangle with Vernonia.

In Tillamook county, salmon angling was described as good in the Nehalem, Nestucca and Wilson rivers. Prospects for the coming week for salmon were also reported good in the Umpqua river in Douglas county.

## Feller Says He'll Get No Cut

New York, Oct. 15 (AP)—Rumors to the contrary, Bob Feller will not be asked to take a cut from his \$80,000 salary of last season.

Rapid Robert is the guy who says so and the one who should know. And if anyone is worried about the condition of his paycheck right arm, Feller says "my arm feels strong and I aim to keep it that way by not going barnstorming this winter. I honestly feel I'm in for a fine season in 1949."

"I'm not at liberty to give any details," Feller said at the end of the world series, "but you'll not be wrong in writing that I won't receive any kind of a salary slash whatsoever. In fact some people might be surprised when and if my 1949 salary is made public."

The pride of Van Meter, Ia., said he had not yet signed his '49 contract. But the hint was there that it had been thoroughly discussed with Cleveland President Bill Veck.

Following Cleveland's world series triumph, Veck remarked: "We have a pitching staff that is good for five more years. Bob Feller still is the best pitcher in baseball. He will prove that next year. He helped us tremendously despite the fact he lost two world series games. Remember, he won seven straight during our stretch drive. Without him, we couldn't have won the pennant. Behind Feller we will have Bob Lemon, Gene Bearden and Steve Gromek."

That should spike any speculation that Feller has pitched his last ball for the Indians, and that the tribe is ready to unload the highest paid pitcher in baseball.

# We're No Shrinking Violets-- We're After Roses, Aiken Sez

"Football is a crazy game, an unpredictable one, but if we win over Southern California in Portland tomorrow we will begin to smell roses," smilingly said Coach Jim Aiken of the University of Oregon as he addressed some 75 members of the Salem Breakfast club Friday morning.

Aiken stated that "we are going to take plenty of chances" against the Trojans. "We may be beaten badly but we will put on a good show. Furthermore we are not going to stand around picking our noses while they score on us." He admitted that it was "now or never" for the Webfoots, but intimated that a victory over Southern Cal would constitute a long stride toward the Rose Bowl.

"We are not a bunch of shrinking violets—neither the players nor the coaches—and we can play inspired football," continued Coach Aiken. He indicated that his team was "up" for the USC contest, adding that an inspired club could well "kick the pants off the opposition."

Referring to last Saturday's game with Idaho, Aiken said the Vandals were "hot" and took advantage of every mistake made by Oregon. He praised his men for their showing against Michigan, pointing out that the "breaks" played an important part in the result.

Aiken said that Wooley Lewis, speedster who has been held out of action since the season's first game, will replace the injured Johnny McKay, left half-back. McKay will probably see service, however.

An overflow crowd is expected for the contest which is expected to be played under favorable weather conditions.

Unbeaten California launches its conference play tomorrow at Berkeley against Oregon State, Stanford journeys south to play UCLA, Washington and Washington State go into their annual battle at Pullman, Montana engages Montana State at Butte and Idaho remains idle.
