The production will be presented to the public at Christmas time. Academy students recently heard a re-broadcast of their Friday's program through the medium of a wire recorder.

When Stobbe fell to the street he cut a hand on a piece of the bottle and first aid was called. Good said his attention was on another boy on a bicycle. First aid also was called for Billy Killinger, 6 months old infant who fell from a second floor window at his home, 235 Hood street, but wasn't hurt except for some minor bruises.

Propose Minor Changes—Only minor changes were proposed in ground floor plans of the new courthouse when the courthouse building commission met Wednesday afternoon with Pietro Belluschi, Portland architect, to discuss his latest group of tentative sketches. The general arrangement of the floor plans has previously been published. At Wednesday's session county officials interested looked over the proposals to offer suggestions and judges and several attorneys had previously examined the sketches. Mr. Belluschi will revamp the plans to meet the suggestions offered and another set is expected to be submitted in a few weeks.
