

### Military Men Out of Nation's Foreign Policy

Washington, March 26 (AP)—The Truman administration is now virtually stripped of the military men who once played important roles in the nation's foreign policy. President Truman apparently did not plan it that way. Despite the often severe criticism leveled at him during his first term for the "military influence" which some columnists and lawmakers saw in U. S. foreign affairs.

It has been a series of resignations, most of which he accepted reluctantly, which has substantially changed the character of Mr. Truman's team of advisers on international matters. The latest came yesterday when Admiral William D. Leahy, 73, retired as a member of the president's White House staff and Gen. Walter Bedell Smith quit one of the nation's most important diplomatic assignments, that of ambassador to Moscow. Leahy, who during the war was U. S. envoy to Vichy France, was Mr. Truman's chief of staff. In the early days of the administration, he reportedly played a large part in developing this nation's "touch" policy toward Russia.

The resignations started in January when the ailing Gen. George C. Marshall quit as secretary of state and was replaced by Dean Acheson, an attorney and former state department official.

At the same time Robert A. Lovett was succeeded as under-secretary by Budget Director James E. Webb. Lovett was wartime assistant secretary of war for air.

Secretary of Defense James Forrestal's resignation is effective at the end of this month. He is credited by insiders with having been deeply concerned with the development of foreign policy—as well as strictly military affairs.

### 'Crowbar Carl' Burglar Nabbed

Oakland, Calif., March 26 (AP)—An ex-convict known as "Crowbar Carl" and ten suspected burglary ring accomplices were jailed early today in a series of raids which resulted in recovery of stolen goods valued at more than \$100,000. Police also got their 8-foot crowbar. Deputy Sheriff Frank Madigan said the arrests are expected to solve some 110 burglaries, in the San Francisco bay area and Fresno and Tulare counties. "Crowbar Carl" was captured before dawn at Sanger, in Fresno county.

Deputy Madigan said "Crowbar Carl" was the leader of the gang, and that his real name is Henry E. Lacey, alias Harold E. Lander. He is 36 years old and was a dental technician by trade, living at South Francisco.

### Maybe Portland Will Have Income Tax

Portland, March 26 (AP)—Portlanders woke up today to find that a third tax agency wanted a cut of their wages. The city was proposing to join the state and federal government in levying an income tax.

As drawn up by Commissioner Ormond R. Bean, the ordinance would take half of one percent of wages—\$25 on a \$5,000 salary. The same levy was proposed on gross business receipts. Bean said it would raise \$2,630,000 annually and that a new amusement ticket tax of 2 to 12 cents would lift the total to \$3,000,000.

He asserted the new taxes were necessary to keep from reducing police and fire protection and other city services. The proposals will be up for a hearing next Thursday. City income taxes were criticized yesterday in a Hoover commission report on governmental affairs.

### Beauty Battles Air Pilot Spouse

New Orleans, March 26 (AP)—Barbara Jean Floyd, "Miss New Orleans of 1948," staged a knockdown battle with her air pilot husband in the lobby of a hotel today. She hit him with a folded newspaper, knocked off his glasses, bit him on the leg and kicked a package from his hand. The husband, Captain George Cauthen of McBee, S.C., retaliated by turning her up and paddling her.

The two were married in Medellin, Columbia, seven weeks ago while Miss Floyd was on a South American goodwill trip. When she returned to New Orleans she first denied having married. Later she said she married Cauthen in order to get free air transportation back home.

After the lobby battle and spanking, Barbara Jean told newsmen: "It didn't hurt much. I had my girdle on."

The Auburn-haired, green-eyed beauty claimed the victory because her husband fled to his room and locked the door. The fight resulted from Miss Floyd's anger at remarks quoted in a published interview with her husband, regarding her seven-week-old marriage.

Miss Floyd, with several hopeful reporters and photographers, had waited for several hours for her husband, threatening to "knock his block off" when he appeared.

As he entered the lobby shortly after noon she ran at him with her newspaper folded, taking a couple of ineffectual swings. He attempted to break loose, repeating, "now, Barbara Jean," but she clung tenaciously on.

Slipping to the floor during the struggle she bit his leg, tearing his trousers. Finally Cauthen told the photographers, who were busily snapping pictures: "I'll show you something now."

He turned her up and paddled her. Cauthen was laughing during most of the scuffle, and expressing apologies to the hotel manager.

### Tobacco Village Winner of Stakes

Des Moines, March 26 (AP)—A North Carolina Tobacco village of 367 population was announced Friday as the sweepstakes winner in a nation-wide community beautification contest.

The MacClesfield, N. C. Woman's club, which has 35 members, will receive \$1,000 as a sweepstakes award and an additional \$1,000 as winner in the 10,000 and under population class in the 1947-1948 "More Beautiful America" contest sponsored by Better Homes and Gardens magazine.

The MacClesfield club won the sweepstakes award by carrying out a six-point program which involved debris removal, home improvement, tree planting, removal of shack dwellings and establishment of a community house.

### Federal Aid In Danger

Portland, March 26 (AP)—Unless Oregon quits diverting funds from game license fees it may lose \$294,784 in federal aid for the state game department.

So warned Robert M. Rutherford, agent for the federal fish, game and wildlife service yesterday after an audit of state game commission books.

"The \$80,000 diverted from game license receipts to the general fund under the state tithing law is excessive," he said, adding "the Pittman-Robertson act providing for federal aid to state game departments prohibits diversion of such funds to other uses."

Rutherford said he had notified the interior department, which could stop the funds. The matter will be taken up with the state legislature by Charles Lockwood, state game director.

Rutherford said he also had investigated transfer of \$600,000 from game funds to the state police. Sportsmen had protested that this was a diversion of funds, he explained. However, he said he found the money was being used for game law enforcement and was therefore not a diversion "within the meaning of the law."

### Trip Aimed at Common Cold

Los Angeles, March 26 (AP)—A streamlined train sped toward Chicago today on a trip that may solve the mystery of the common cold.

The Santa Fe super chief left here yesterday with two 10-inch metal test-tubes taped to the top of its big diesel engine. Inside the train, "riding herd" on the precious tubes, was Dr. E. C. Rosenow, 73, of Cincinnati's Longview hospital.

Rosenow clambered up a ladder to tape on the tubes before the train pulled out. By analyzing what goes through their fine wire screens and what is absorbed by glass wool during the long run, Rosenow hopes to find out if the common cold virus is in the air itself.

Those troublesome sniffles may result from something in the air and not be communicable between persons, the bacteriologist believes. As a result of similar research, he found that the air contains pneumonia bacteria during the winter and polio and sleeping sickness in the summer.

### Princess Fawzia to Marry Rich Major

Cairo, March 26 (AP)—Princess Fawzia, sister of King Farouk, will be married Monday to a handsome, wealthy Egyptian major, Ksmail Sherine Bey, it was announced officially today.

Princess Fawzia's divorce from the Shah of Iran was announced last November. The wedding will be in Abdin palace, Arim Tabet Bey, royal press counselor said.

### Woman Wants Favorite Cat Buried in Casket With Her

Portland, March 26 (AP)—Can an animal-lover have a cat buried in a casket with her?

That was the question confronting the Humane Society and an undertaker here today. And while both agreed they knew of no law against it, they did not believe Mrs. Bessie Sweet, 76, would be buried with her favorite cat.

Mrs. Sweet, long a friend of Portland's homeless animals, died Thursday. The humane society found 15 cats in her apartment. There also was a will directing that they be killed by the humane society.

This was done. Then there was found a provision directing that her favorite cat, "Judy," be placed inside her casket, cremated and buried with her. An official of the undertaking firm snorted:

"We're not exactly in the business of cremating animals." He doubted that it would be done, although it might if Mrs. Sweet's friends insisted.

There is another hitch, though. The humane society reported it did not know which of the 15 dead cats was Judy. The humane society planned to bury the 15 in its own animal cemetery, the same day Mrs. Sweet's body will be interred on the other side of town.

### Tension Lifts In Coal Fields

Pittsburgh, March 26 (AP)—The tension was off in the coal fields today.

It was off, too, in industries—such as steel—which depend on coal for their operations. It was off among employees of coal-carrying railroads, among river workers who transport coal in barges.

For John L. Lewis had ordered his miners to return to the pits next Monday, ending a two-week work stoppage of 463,000 members of the United Mine Workers in pits east of the Mississippi.

The fear had been lurking almost everywhere that the strike would not end at the close of the two-week period, called as a memorial to men killed and injured in the mines last year. The fear had become pronounced after the U. S. senate confirmed appointment of Dr. James Boyd as director of the U. S. bureau of mines, since Lewis had announced the strike also was a protest against Mr. Boyd's nomination to the post.

Now the fear was lifted. A & P Pays \$175,000 Fine Danville, Ill., March 26 (AP)—The Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea company, and its co-defendants, today paid a \$175,000 fine imposed on conviction of charges of conspiracy to restrain and monopolize trade.

### Wherry Raps Marshall Plan

Washington, March 26 (AP)—A senate republican leader charged today that the Marshall plan extension bill could be used to finance the development of British oil refineries "all over the globe."

GOP Floor Leader Kenneth S. Wherry of Nebraska protested the present wording of a provision to authorize Paul G. Hoffman, administrator of the European recovery program, to assist any project abroad that is producing a material which is scarce here.

Wherry told newsmen that, as now written, this provision "could be used for anything under the sun."

"American dollars," he said, "could be used to build factories in Europe and Africa, to produce goods that would be sold in competition with our own and to carry out President Truman's 'point four' program (for underdeveloped world areas)."

The Nebraska senator said he would ask redrafting of the provision which was sponsored by Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr. (R., Mass.), as a means of increasing the supply of raw materials for U. S. strategic stockpiles.

For the past two days the senate has been considering legislation to extend the European recovery program for 15 months and to authorize the economic cooperation administration to spend \$5,580,000,000 in that period.

### Agencies Ordered to End Discrimination

Washington, March 26 (AP)—The Fair Employment board Friday ordered all government agencies to end racial and religious discrimination in federal employment, and issued instructions for carrying out its policy. In a directive supplementing

### Better Portland Noted By Urban League

Portland, Ore., March 26 (AP)—The Portland Urban League, which now declares Portland "is the most improved city in the nation, in the arena of race relations," will hold its annual meeting April 3.

Speakers at the one day meeting to be held in the Benson high school auditorium will include: Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee, Irving Enns, executive secretary of the Portland Junior Chamber of Commerce; Rev. Thomas Tobin, vicar general of the city's archdiocese, and E. Shelton Hill, industrial secretary of the Urban League.

It instructed all agencies to put this creed into practice immediately for federal employees. The Fair Employment board was set up by Mr. Truman last July.

### Harvard Invites Harold Laski

New York, March 26 (AP)—Dr. Harold J. Laski, British labor party leader who has been barred from speaking on the University of California campus at Los Angeles, Friday accepted an invitation to speak at Harvard university.

The Sidney Hillman foundation, a labor union organization which is sponsoring Laski's lecture in this country, said the political scientist will speak before the Harvard law school forum on April 21. The foundation said it had "challenged" University of California officials to reconsider the cancellation of Laski's lecture as "an infringement on academic freedom."
