Navy Training Center Gets Fire Protection

The 13th naval district's training center southeast of the city will get fire protection, and pay a fee of \$800 a year.

That was voted by the city council Monday night when a letter came from naval authorities negotiating for the protection.

The city's charge to out-of-town communities is 4 mills on assessed property valuation. The naval installation is valued at about \$1,000,000. Reduced to the county assessment ratio, City Manager Franzen said, at 4 mills, that would amount to about \$1800 a year.

"It seems to me that's pretty high," he said. He suggested \$800 or \$1000.

Alderman Gille moved for \$800, which was voted.

Kiggins Tries For Back Pay

Hobart Kiggins, who resigned from the Salem police Saturday, made an effort at the city council meeting Monday night, through Alderman Tom Armstrong, to get a substantial amount in back pay.

Armstrong dropped the matter after an explanation had been made by City Manager Franzen.

When the police department was reorganized over a year ago Kiggins, a chief of detectives, was made a captain. Franzen told the council last night this was a promotion.

The change, however, wasn't acceptable to Kiggins, and he resigned. He had a good record as an officer, and after an absence of about a month, was re-employed in the department. The office of detective chief, having been eliminated, Kiggins had to accept \$15 a month less than formerly.

He made the statement, and it was mentioned by Armstrong Monday night, that Mayor Elstrom promised him his old pay would be restored. Manager Franzen said he had no knowledge of any conversation that might have taken place between Kiggins and the mayor, but that Kiggins had never discussed it with the manager.

Armstrong wanted to know "why one of the captains is getting more money than the others?"

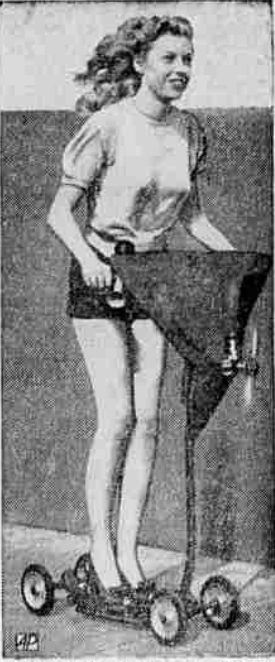
"Those captains are now getting the same salary," Franzen said.

Armstrong withdrew a motion he had made that the manager investigate the Kiggins case.

Ex-Teacher of Sutherland Suicide

Roseburg, March 29 (AP)—Mrs. Ellamae Opal Holm, 39, former Sutherland school teacher, committed suicide by hanging Saturday, Coroner Harry C. Stearns reported Monday.

Her body was discovered by her husband, Ivan Eugene Holm, in a granary adjacent to their home five miles east of Sutherland. She left no note, but she had been in ill health recently. Besides her husband and two children, Mrs. Holm leaves relatives in Vallejo, Calif., where the Holms lived prior to coming to Sutherland 3 1/2 years ago.

The new method to be shown is the art of writing shorthand on a machine. These machines have been in use in Portland for the past five years.

The Salem class will be limited to 30 students.

Charlie Chaplin Again Becomes Dad

Santa Monica, Cal., March 29 (AP)—Charlie Chaplin, the 58-year-old comedian, and his fourth wife had their third child Monday.

The six-and-a-half pound girl, their second daughter, was born shortly after midnight at St. John's hospital. Nurses said the mother, Oona O'Neill, 23, and the baby were going well.

The Chaplins' two other children are a 4-year-old daughter, Geraldine, and a 3-year-old son Michael. Chaplin has three other children by three other wives, and a superior court jury said he had a fourth by Joan Barry, his red-haired ex-protege.

Baum Boosts Palmer Speech

Dr. W. W. Baum of Salem is Marion county chairman to stimulate interest in the talk of Cecil Palmer, English publisher, author and journalist who will discuss "What Socialism is Doing to British Freedom," at Benson high school auditorium in Portland at 8 p.m. Wednesday, April 6.

No admission will be charged. Mr. Palmer's Portland visit is under sponsorship of the Oregon Advertising club as an activity of the club's Oregon-American club committee.

Advertising club officers have made arrangements for Palmer to speak at the weekly meeting of the club Wednesday noon. Membership of several Portland service clubs which meet Wednesday has been invited to meet with Advertising club members.

Until his retirement in 1936, Palmer published writings of G. B. Shaw, G. K. Chesterton, H. G. Wells and other noted British writers.

Palmer describes himself as "not a politician, belonging to no political party." His talks in support of individual freedom and free enterprise feature his theory that "socialism is merely halfway, the real end of such a political course being communism."

Palmer claims that the present socialistic government of England went into office under the guise of the Labor party. Nationalism was not a campaign issue, he says.
