The answer has been supplied by Jack Van Coevering in an article appearing in the May issue of "Sports Affeld." The author has taken the pains to investigate the survival rate in many of the states

and comes to the conclusion that "if they get a decent break on nesting activities, there will be more of them this fall in most of the western states. Shooting will be better." The forecast does not necessarily mean "a return to the heydey of the early '40s.
