

Senators Top Canucks, 11-1

Victoria, B. C., May 11.—The Salem Senators manufactured a seven-run spree in the second inning against the Victoria Athletics Tuesday night to take the second game of the current series, 11 to 1. The win coupled with Yakima's loss to Bremerton, 6-3, enabled the squad from Oregon's capital to gain a full game on the league-leading Packers.

For Jim Olson, winning pitcher, it was his third successive victory without a single setback. He had perfect control over the Athletics and while he fanned two, he issued no bases on balls and limited the opposition to five blows, including Frank Cirmelli's circuit clout in the third.

Homers were hit by Larry Ortel and Manager Bill Beard for the Senators. Ortel's blow came in the second when the bases were loaded. Beard whanged a four bauer off Cirmelli as he came up to start the eighth.

The Senators batted more than around in the second with Bob Cherry, Beard, Jim Wert, Olson, and Wayne Peterson hitting successive singles. In between Beard and Wert, Al Spaeter drew a base on balls that forced home a runner.

Over the entire Western International circuit the four games produced a total of 100 base hits, 19 errors and 68 runs. The Spokane Indians, playing their first game on Ferris field since the disastrous fire of last fall, absorbed a 21-7 beating from the Tacoma Tigers. Five Spokane pitchers tried to stop the assault without avail. The setback was the eighth straight for the Indians.

Deschutes Dam Study Delays Hatchery Work

Portland, May 11 (AP)—The Oregon fish commission has postponed plans for a Metolius river hatchery until the state hydro-electric commission rules on whether there can be a dam on the Deschutes.

The commission yesterday held back \$50,000 from the Deschutes tributary project, but voted a similar amount for a hatchery at Big Creek near Astoria.

Should the Pelton dam proposed by private utilities be given the green-light by the hydro-electric group, which has held a hearing on the project, the full \$100,000 will go into the Astoria plan.

New York, May 11 (AP)—Nothing is quite so mystifying in this new major league season as the sudden rise of the supposedly atrocious Washington Senators, who have won eight straight games and threaten to keep it up.

They even have Owner Clark Griffith and Manager Joey Kuhel baffled as to what has brought about their amazing reversal of form.

Griffith, taking note of the fact that the usually punchless Senators have hit 22 homers, more than any other club in the majors except the New York Giants, said "We've got a real power laden club all right—now if we just had a little pitching."

Kuhel, an amateur magician, who is suspected of having employed his legendariness in the current winning streak, took a little different view of the club's potentialities.

"We're not going to roll over and play dead for anybody," he said. "We've got plenty of pitching and a good defense, if we can just start hitting."
