No Damage Done to Lebanon Berries

Lebanon — While many Oregon strawberry areas were hit by early frost causing from 35 to 40 per cent dockage, no damage is apparent in the Lebanon area with no dockage recorded at the local packing plant where berries are reported of excellent size and quality.

Growers are paying pickers an average of 3½ cents, with a half cent bonus for staying through the season. Cannery prices to growers were currently at 14 cents, cash price. Both figures are subject to daily changes, cannery officials stated.

First berries received last week at the Lebanon Packing plant were cold packed and canned in two separate operations. Good weather will see an immediate resumption of canning and packing operations.
