

Police Abandon Convict Hunt

Portland, June 7 (AP)—Police today abandoned posse hunts east of here for the two Oregon convicts who escaped the state prison on Memorial day.

Multnomah County Sheriff's Capt. Earl Stanley said officers working the area have not flushed another likely clue since two vagrants seen near Troutdale were believed to be life-timer John O. Pinson and cell-mate William P. Benson.

Armed possemen were called in from the interwinding rural and logging road areas last night. State police continued checks of motor traffic eastward in the Columbia gorge. The county officers continued the search near here but reduced it to routine patrol.

Mr. and Mrs. George Dietz reported two men begged food from them Sunday. The woman identified one of them as Benson. She said the other could have been Pinson. A small campsite was found nearby in the brush.

Pinson and Benson went over the prison wall at Salem in a hail of gunfire after sawing their way out of a correction cell. They were confined there for previous escape attempts.

Pinson was convicted in the slaying of a state policeman. Benson was an armed robbery convict.

Plan Zoning Of Kingwood

Little or no opposition has appeared relative to the question of zoning classification in the Kingwood water district annexation to the city of Salem, which will be up for public hearing Tuesday night before the city planning and zoning commission.

Under a tentative report of the commission it is proposed that all of that part of the area lying in Polk county east of Wallace road will be made a Class IV unrestricted district for industrial uses.

Proposed for classification as a Class III business district is that part of the area described officially as follows:

"Beginning at the most easterly northeast corner of the city of West Salem, and running thence westerly along the northerly boundary line of the city of West Salem (along Ninth street) to the east line of Patterson avenue 150 feet; thence easterly, and parallel to the aforementioned northern boundary line of the city of West Salem, to the west line of Wallace road; thence southerly along the west line of Wallace road to the point of beginning."

All the rest of the area would be classified as Class I residential, limited to single family dwellings for use for residence purposes only.

The establishment of set-back lines also will be considered at the hearing.

Morse Gets Credit For Mill City Aid

W. M. (Jack) Bartlett, director of the state board of aeronautics, said Monday the board feels grateful to Senator Wayne L. Morse for assistance given in relieving the airport difficulty at Mill City.

The Bonneville dam construction has proposed construction of a 90-foot tower near the air field that would have made it practically useless for air service. Senator Morse contacted the Bonneville administration and got an agreement whereby a line of poles, 50 feet lower than the proposed tower, would be erected to serve the purposes of the power facility.

The wood poles will be temporary, and a survey will be made for a later relocation of steel towers.

Jake Bird Loses Appeal

San Francisco, June 7 (AP)—Jake Bird, convicted Tacoma, Wash., axe murderer, today lost his legal battle to escape the hangman's noose.

Chief Justice William Denman of the ninth circuit court of appeals denied Bird's petition for a writ of probable cause, by which he sought a complete review of his case.

Favors Spread Of Shipbuilding

Washington, June 7 (AP)—President Truman favors a distribution of shipbuilding work along all of the nation's coasts, a house merchant marine subcommittee was told today.

Rep. Jackson (D., Wash.) said Mr. Truman expressed his views on two occasions to a bipartisan west coast committee which called on him last year and again this spring.

Jackson told the committee the president mentioned west coast yards in particular. He quoted Mr. Truman as saying he favored some allocation of work to the West Coast, where no ocean-going vessels now are being built, as a national defense measure.

Jackson said the President referred to the possibility that the Panama Canal might be put out of use, thus blocking transfer of new ships from the east to the west coast.

Jackson was one of several witnesses who testified concerning a bill by Rep. Allen (R., Calif.) designed to allocate ship construction among the yards of the east, Gulf and Pacific coasts so as to maintain facilities and employ know-how.

Wheat Control Vote July 23

Washington, June 7 (AP)—The agriculture department has set July 23 as the tentative date for a nation-wide farmer referendum on rigid production controls for the 1950 wheat crops.

Final decision on whether controls will be proposed by Secretary Brannan awaits an estimate of this year's wheat crop, to be issued by the department's crop reporting board Friday. The purpose of controls would be to keep supplies from becoming too large and too depressing on grower prices.

If the estimate indicates a crop of more than 1,300,000,000 bushels, the secretary is expected to take formal action setting up marketing quotas on next year's crop. A month ago the crop was forecast at about 1,312,000,000 bushels. Reports indicate that it had made favorable progress in the meantime.

Quotas would have to be approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum.

Pickets Clash On NY Docks

New York, June 7 (AP)—Violence broke out today when rival picket lines demonstrated at entrances of the AFL International Longshoremen's association.

Nearly 2000 longshoremen from Hudson river piers joined their fellows in one picket line and charged a group of rival demonstrators.

Mounted police and foot patrolmen pushed into the battling groups, chasing them east and west on 14th street and north on Eighth avenue.

Passersby caught in the melee were knocked down as mounted police rode onto the sidewalks. Many longshoremen were felled and several policemen were struck by fists and sticks.

Within a few minutes two police emergency squads reinforced policemen already at the scene and the battling longshoremen were dispersed.

The demonstrations interrupted loading and unloading operations on 19 ships at New York piers.

The first group of pickets took up positions early in protest against what they termed discrimination in hiring practices on Brooklyn piers. Their demonstration followed a sit-down of 38 Negroes in the ILA offices yesterday.

Within a short time a rival group of pickets appeared in a demonstration termed by ILA officials as "an answer by loyal members to the communist-inspired picket line."

Police kept the groups apart until the 2000 longshoremen made their charge.

Leonard Younce OSC Line Coach

Corvallis, June 7 (AP)—Leonard Younce, former all-Coast and all-American guard at Oregon State college and later all-professional at the same position, will be the new line coach at his alma mater.

The announcement was made this morning by Athletic Director Spec Keene. Younce succeeds Jim Dixon, who resigned after 18 years to become a full time physical education instructor.

Younce, originally from Roosevelt high school of Portland, played three years for the OSC varsity, his last season in 1940. He was with the New York Giants of the National Football league from 1941 to 1948, with the exception of the 1942 and 1943 seasons. Last year he was the team captain and so-called "playing line coach."

Younce has been an assistant at Portland university for the last four spring practice seasons and had some prep school coaching experience in the east. He will report to the new job on July 1.

Salemites Invited To Join Excursion

Throngs Crowd Lebanon Show

Lebanon, June 6—The annual Lebanon strawberry festival ended one of its most successful two-day runs in history Saturday, when nearly 50,000 shirt-sleeved persons took advantage of good weather to visit the affair.

Exhibit buildings were crowded all day, and latecomers had to stand a full city block away from the street platform during the afternoon and evening programs.

Horse racing and boxing matches also drew near capacity houses, and concession stands and amusement rides on the Main street "midway" were going strong all day.

The Tarem family of father and mother and three daughters, Estonians who spent approximately four years in displaced person camps in Germany, is expected to arrive in Salem within the next two weeks. The father will engage in physical education work at the YMCA and Willamette university.

The Tarems left Bremen, Germany, May 28 for New York. While on the Atlantic coast Tarem will visit the Springfield college campus. He holds degrees from that institution. Prior to the war he taught physical education in European colleges and is the author of several books.

Negro Fights For Estate

Los Angeles, June 7 (AP)—A Negro chauffeur is entitled to all his 90-year-old white wife's \$50,000 estate, his attorney says, even though she disinherited him in her will.

Thomas L. Griffith, the attorney, said yesterday that Allan L. G. Woods, 28, the Negro, plans to contest the document. It and a codicil were drafted before the marriage, Griffith pointed out.

And since Mrs. Woods, known as a traveler, lecturer and club-woman, has no other relatives, the attorney added, her husband is entitled to the property under the California law of succession.

Mrs. Woods, whose estate is estimated at more than \$50,000, died May 28, some five months after her marriage to her chauffeur.

2 Drowned in Catalina Trip

Balboa, Calif., June 7 (AP)—Two persons were feared drowned and 14 others, mostly children, were rescued from the choppy seas in the traffic end of a grammar school boating trip to Catalina island.

Survivors arrived early today at this yachting harbor to tell a horror-filled tale of an accident that swept 16 off the decks of the fishing boat Otay yesterday as it was headed here from Catalina. Some 23 children and their escorts were aboard the craft. Ages of the children ranged from four to 16.

The coast guard gave this account:

The 50-foot power cruiser started to list when its gas tanks drained unevenly. At it listed, a southeast ground swell in the choppy channel smacked it and loosened a live bait tank. The tank fell off and in doing so jolted the ship so suddenly that it almost capsized. The jolt swept overboard the 16 on decks.

Some of them were able to climb back on as the helmsman righted the ship with a sudden turn of the wheel.

The others clung to life rafts. Another fishing boat, the Skip-alou, was nearby and attracted by flashlight signals, sped to the rescue. Some of the survivors were in the water more than an hour.

However, the coast guard said Dr. Victor Mann, an optometrist of Fullerton, and Geraldine Clark, 12, Houston, Texas, a student at Valencia junior academy, Fullerton, were missing. The cruise was in honor of the eighth grade graduates of the Seventh Day Adventist academy.

Rose Carnival to Open Wednesday Eve

Portland, June 7 (AP)—Portland's rose festival opens tomorrow night with coronation of Joyce Sommerlade as queen.

A territorial band jamboree will feature Thursday night's show with the Butte, Mont. High school band the central group among the 2000 high school musicians.

The floral parade, annual highlight of the festival, will be held Friday morning, starting from Multnomah stadium and

winding through the business district before disbanding on the east side of the river.

Saturday's principal event will be the junior parade for small fry.

A ski meet at Timberline Lodge on Mount Hood Sunday will wind up the festival.

Harriman May Again Head ECA

Washington, June 7 (AP)—Some observers believed today that the stage now is set for W. Averell Harriman to become the head man of America's European recovery effort this summer or fall.

They said that recent changes in the operating hierarchy of the economic co-operation administration make it appear that the former secretary of commerce is a cinch to take over whenever Administrator Paul G. Hoffman decides to step down.

Harriman is now special U.S. representative to Europe for the recovery program, with the rank of ambassador.

Hoffman, who gave up the presidency of Studebaker Corp. and took a healthy salary cut to become recovery chief, would like to resume life as a private citizen at his home in Pasadena, Calif. He tells questioners, however, that "I cannot, in good conscience, give up this job at this time."

Harriman's stock rose this past week when William C. Foster was named deputy ECA administrator at Washington. Foster will take over shortly for Howard Bruce, 69-year-old Baltimore industrialist, banker and political leader who is returning to private life.

Dies in Sawdust Bin

Roseburg, June 7 (AP)—Hubert W. Holland, 38, smothered in the sawdust bin of the Roseburg Lumber company yesterday.

Holland apparently fell into the bin, and died before he was discovered by the watchman.
