Western Group Agrees on Duck Season Limits

Seattle, June 16 (AP)—Agreement on a 60-day duck season for 1949 and a seven-bird bag limit was reached here by delegates from the seven western states to the western migratory bird conference.

Delegates also asked that jack snipe and mourning dove seasons be added, that shooting hours be set from a half-hour before sunrise to sunset, that the possession limit be two days' bag limit, and that the goose limit be five per day.

Delegates approved a \$2 duck stamp, provided at least 25 percent of the increase be used for protection, and approved the program of more refuges in the Pacific flyway.
