Salem Looking Ahead to Next Census Due in 1950

Salem really has something to look forward to come the 1950 census. Maybe the old town won't quite have doubled its population in the last 10 years, but it will be very close to it.

Just now it's about 52,000. For people keep coming here to live. The Chamber of Commerce is listing the newcomers at an average of 18 1/2 a week. But that isn't all. Nearly every one the chamber lists has a wife, or wife and children, and represents by scientific computation 3.6 persons. That makes an actual average of 66.6 persons a week.
