Bevos Continue Victory Skein over O'Doul Seals

San Francisco, June 22 (AP)—Frank Joseph "Lefty" O'Doul, perennial pilot of the San Francisco Seals, once said that the toughest thing in baseball was to manage a club into a pennant. He was right.

Last night the veteran manager watched his sagging seals belittled 6-4 by the fast improving Portland Beavers. And today's Pacific Coast baseball club cooling its heels next to the cellar door.

The O'Doulmen, who are in one of the worst positions in more than a decade, were snuffed under by the six-hit pitching of knuckleballer George Diehl in a series opener at San Francisco. Two home run clouts by Mickey Rocco and Walt Judnick for three of the Seals' four tallies and kept them in the game for awhile but the Beavers had on their hitting togs. They touched Jack Brewer for 11 hits, five of them doubles, and they bunched the safeties in the right places.

The biggest hitting barrage of the evening took place at Los Angeles where the Angels stilled the Seattle Rainiers by a lopsided 17-0. Booker "Cannonball" McDaniels, fresh from the Kansas City Monarchs, made his first appearance before the hometown crowd and pleased them with a six-hit batter.

Sacramento played host to Oakland and nipped them 7-3 in a see-saw ball game. The Solons broke up the game in the seventh with a four-run attack featured by two singles and doubles by Pete Coscarart and Fred Marsh. It was the 11th win for Solon Pitcher Frankie Dasso as he tossed six-hit ball.

The league leading Hollywood Stars handed the faltering San Diego Padres their seventh straight loss, outlasting them 9-6 at the border town park. The Pads outdid the Stars 14-13 but went under when Hollywood rallied for five runs in the ninth. The Padres came back in the last of the ninth to score three runs on two singles, a double and Max West's 26th homer but the six-run lead was too much top.
