Pea Harvest Half of 1948's

Volume of the pea crop in the Canby area was approxi-mately one-half that of last year with the crop processed this year by the 11 pea-vining machines of the Birdseye-Snider canning firm and shipped to the company's cannery at Woodburn for packing.

Late spring frosts and the prolonged early dry weather are blamed for the poor yield this year with representatives of the company stating that the grade harvested is also consider-ably poorer than that of last year.

Nearly 400 acres of peas were planted by 21 growers of the area under contract to the processors. Prices ranged from \$118 per ton for top quality down to \$33 for the lowest grade, ap-proximately the same as the grower received last year. Most grower received last year. Most of the Carby area yield this year graded out at a second, third and fourth, bringing prices of \$104, \$85 and \$65 per ton. The crop averaged less than one ton per acre as compared with the top and a half and more last ton and a half and more last year.
