## Rodent Control Plan Covers Many Acres

Aurora—A total of 7,681.75 acres of farmland in southwest Clackamas county were treated for moles and pocket gophers up to May 31 in the program organized by the Clackamas county farm bureau, with the cooperation of the county extension service, according to a report made public by Howard Smith and Don Gardner of the farm bureau committee.

The cost varied widely, from 10 cents to \$2.04 per acre, with an average of 54½ cents per acre. Tests showed that using poisoned earthworms for moles and poisoned alfalfa or clover tips for gophers, planting the bait directly in their runways, resulted in a kill of 77 per cent of the moles and 90 per cent of the gophers.

The farm bureau and its co-operators are making their pest control service available to farmers in the county at actual cost, and invite inquiries either to Howard Smith or Donald Gardner of Canby, or through Don Walrod of the county extension office.

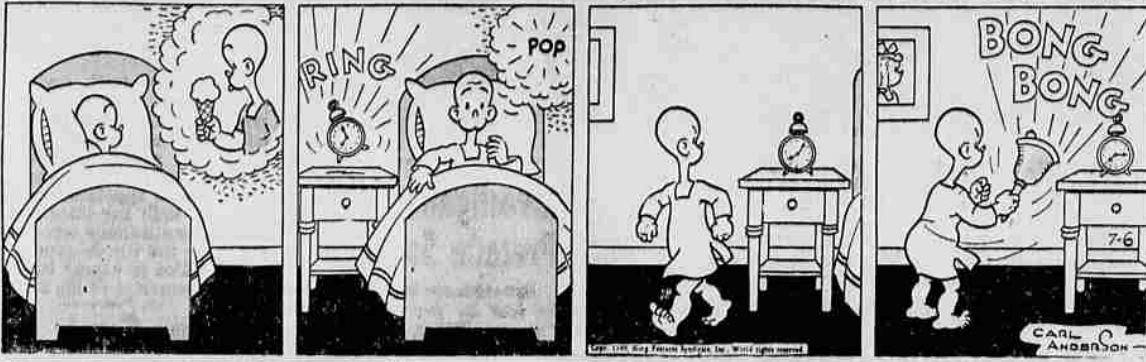
## Pembertons Welcome Guests for Holiday
