Truck Driver Hit by Train

Albany, July 7—Trapped in the crumpled cab of a dump truck loaded with gravel, Grant Merle Gillaspie, 22, Corvallis, was critically injured Wednesday when his truck was struck by a west-bound Southern Pacific freight train near the intersection of the Scenic Drive road and U.S. highway No. 20 two miles west of Albany.

According to information procured by State Police Officer Everett Hockema, Gillaspie was employed by Benton county hauling gravel for distribution on roads in the area and had just turned from the highway into the Scenic Drive road, approaching a steep hill.

The train, No. 708, struck the truck at the driver's seat and hurled the vehicle 44 feet.

The fireman, Norris Anderson, Salem, told Officer Hockema that he did not see the truck until the engine was 15 or 20 feet away. He and the engineer, John Stahl, Albany, immediately braked down and the train stopped within 630 feet. The impact damaged but did not disable the engine.

Dr. W. W. Ball, Corvallis, chanced to be near the scene and he helped to extricate Gillaspie from the cab while Anderson, armed with a fire extinguisher, put out a fire that had started under the vehicle.

Gillaspie was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital at Corvallis in an Albany ambulance.

Salvation Army Children's Camp

Applications for a week's outing at the Salvation Army camp for crippled children and mothers will be received at the Salem corps office, 241 State street, until Tuesday, July 12, according to Captain R. B. Leshar.

The camp is being devoted to handicapped children for the first time and more than 50 applications have already been received, Leshar said. Capacity is limited to 75 with every indication that this number will be reached shortly.

The camp is free to mothers accompanying their children as well as for the children themselves. A trained staff is being furnished by The Oregon Society for Crippled Children who will be in attendance augmenting the regular camp staff.

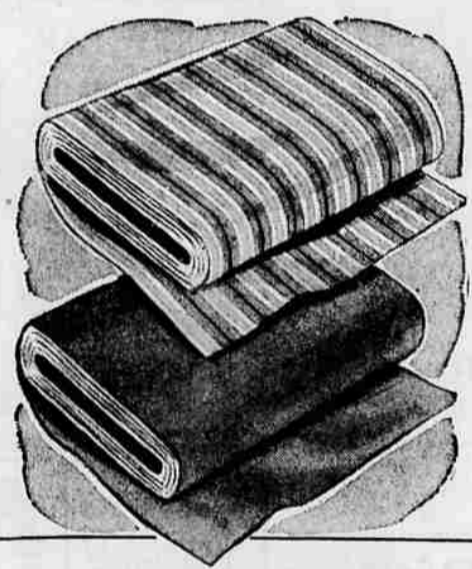

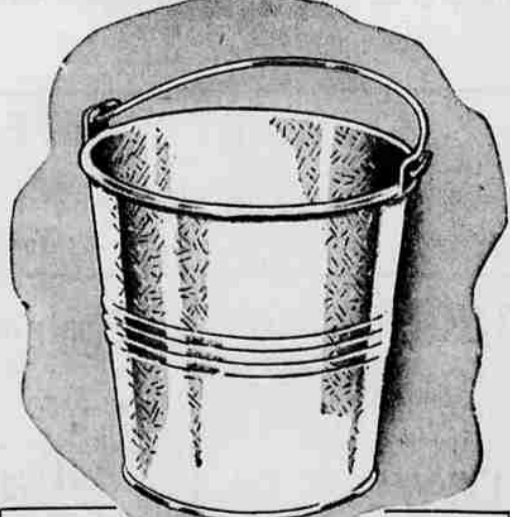
