Eugene Annexation Valid Rules Supreme Court
The state supreme court ruled valid today the November 2, 1948 election at which Eugene annexed the South Willamette street area.
Then the court recessed until September 6. But it will come back to hear any emergency cases which might come up.
The suit contesting the Eugene annexation election was brought by Charles Witham, a brewery operator who lives in the annexed territory. It was brought against Mayor Earl McNutt and the Eugene city council.
Witham claimed the election was illegal, charging insufficient notices were posted, that persons favoring the annexation electioneered at the polls, and that ballots were given to persons who did not live in the territory involved.
But the high court, in a decision by Justice James T. Brand, disposed of all of Witham's charges, which were denied by Mayor McNutt and the council. The decision upheld Circuit Judges Dal M. King and G. F. Skipworth.
The high court also upheld another Lane county case, this being the suit of Leonard Stuhr to collect compensation from the state industrial accident commission. Stuhr failed to collect a cent.
Stuhr was hired by Lane county to haul gravel for county roads. He was blinded when a piece of steel flew into his eye.
The decision, by Justice Arthur D. Hay, upheld Circuit Judge King's contention that Stuhr's accident did not occur while he was working.
Other court action today:
Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Champ vs. Mr. and Mrs. Lanest Stewart, appellants, Appeal from Marion county. Suit to elect from property. Opinion by Justice George Keenan, Judge E. M. Page, affirmed.
Dr. and Mrs. W. F. Gulek vs. George B. Copeland, appellants, Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit over contract to sell property. Opinion by Justice J. C. Bailey, Judge Alfred P. Dobson, affirmed.
Robert Eastman, Portland attorney, was suspended by the court for six months during which he will not be allowed to practice law. Eastman was accused of unprofessional conduct in charges brought by the board of governors of the Oregon State Bar.

Reuther to Win His 3rd Term
Milwaukee, July 12 (AP)—Red-haired Walter P. Reuther was expected to route his left-wing opposition today and sweep easily to his third straight term as president of the giant CIO United Auto Workers.
The scrappy 41-year-old labor leader appeared certain to emerge with more power than ever as the 2,354 national convention delegates voted for their four top officers.
Secretary-treasurer Earl Mazey and Vice-president Richard Gosser and John W. Livingston also were slated for landslide reelection victories.
This became apparent last night as the delegates unanimously endorsed the Reuther slate while only 100 delegates showed up for a caucus of the left-wing "Progressive Unity" slate.
Carrying the standard for the Unity caucus was W. G. Grant, former president of Ford local 600. John Lindall of Detroit was matched against Mazey for secretary-treasurer, while William Johnston and Dominic Digalbo were in the race for vice-president against Gosser and Livingston.
The progressive-unity caucus was a loose coalition comprising remnants of the old UAW left-wing factions and anti-Reutherites.
The only setback Reuther has suffered so far came late yesterday when the delegates voted six to four to reject his plea for biennial conventions and two-year terms for officers.

Grains Follow Uncertain Line
Chicago, July 12 (AP)—Grains followed an uncertain course in today's board of trade session. Off at the start, around a cent for some deliveries, short covering developed a rally. Later this buying dried up and prices dipped again, more than losing their early gains.
Soybeans and lard, however, withstood the selling in grains and at times beans were up as much as 5 cents a bushel for the July delivery.
Both corn and wheat reacted to a better than expected government crop estimate. Floor talk indicated that wheat in the Canadian provinces has suffered considerable damage from hot weather.
The thin rye market gained strength on reports of damage to the Canadian crop. Oats followed the trend of corn.
At the finish wheat was 1 1/2 to 2 cents lower than yesterday's close, July 2.00 1/2-3/4. Oats were 1/4 higher to 1/2 lower, July 6 1/4. Rye was 1 cent to 3/4 higher, July 1.47 1/4. Soybeans were 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, July 2.56 1/2-3/4. Lard was 10 to 20 cents a hundredweight higher, July 10.55.

700,000 Italian Steel Workers on Strike
Milan, Italy, July 12 (AP)—Northern Italy's important steel and machinery industry closed today as approximately 700,000 communist union workers quit their jobs in a 24-hour protest strike.
The strike was called by the Italian Federation of Metal Workers (FIOM), a branch of the communist Italian Confederation of Labor (CGIL). FIOM claims 671,000 members among the industry's 900,000 workers.
Members of the non-communist free General Federation of Labor (CGIL), refused to participate in the walkout but their numbers are small.
Apparently, the 24-hour work stoppage was a show-of-strength maneuver by the communist-controlled union to back up demands in contract negotiations with owners which opened in Rome today.

Suit to Force Gas Sales by Standard
Los Angeles, July 12 (AP)—Standard Oil company is restrained by court order from refusing to sell gasoline to a serve yourself firm.
Eagle Oil company, operator of 600 filling stations, several of the self-service type, in Los Angeles county, requested the restraining order—granted yesterday. Standard's suit alleged that Standard conspired to prevent it from obtaining petroleum products in violation of anti-trust laws.
The complaint alleged further that standard requires as a condition of sale that retailers must not sell at prices lower than in Standard-owned or controlled stations. The suit also charged that Standard and other major oil firms—named as co-defendants—deprived independent stations of gasoline to maintain a price structure, despite a surplus of fuel.
A famous wire maker, Ichabod Washburn, produced a steel wire, at low cost, suitable for use in hoop skirts.

OK Korean Fund
Washington, July 12 (AP)—The senate foreign relations committee today approved a \$50,000,000 Korean recovery program without anti-communist restrictions proposed by the house committee.
