

Truman Raps Breach of Faith by Russia After War

Chicago, July 20 (AP)—Struggling democracies had President Truman's assurance today of United States leadership to provide "enough force" to maintain peace in a world he said is endangered by broken Russian promises.

With the United Nations charter signed and the collapse of Japan, he said, the peace for which the world had prayed "didn't come—it didn't come."

"For we found that we had an ally, an ally whose habit it is, and whose habit it has been since 1917, to make agreements for the purpose of breaking them," he declared.

"Now it is absolutely necessary that we assume the leadership among the democracies of the world, so that there will be enough force in this world to maintain the peace."

Mr. Truman's remarks were delivered off the cuff at a Shrine dinner at the Stevens hotel last night following a formal address earlier in the day at Soldiers field.

At the big lake front stadium he reported apparently increasing "tensions and conflicts" behind the iron curtain.

The dinner address, his third of the day, climaxed his attendance at the diamond jubilee session of the Shriners of North America.

Talking to 2,000 nobles and their ladies, he said if the United States had stayed out of the United Nations "the only thing left for us would be to crawl into our shells and prepare for the destruction of the world, and ourselves with it."

Contrasting current expenditures with those of the war, Mr. Truman said the 1946 fiscal year budget called for spending \$103,000,000,000.

He said that the month after Japan folded up in September, 1945, he cancelled \$60,000,000,000 in war contracts "and made a recession in expenditures of \$63,000,000,000."

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Israeli-Syrian Pact Signed

Tel Aviv, Israel, July 20 (AP)—The Israeli-Syrian armistice was signed today, it was announced here.

An Israeli government spokesman expressed satisfaction with the agreement, adding that it means Israel now has armistice arrangements with all neighboring countries.

Israel previously had signed agreements with Egypt, Transjordan and Lebanon. Those agreements also covered elements of Saudi Arabian and Iraqi troops which had fought against the new Jewish state.

Condon Asks For Hearing

Washington, July 20 (AP)—Dr. Edward U. Condon asked congress today to safeguard a person's right to present his own case once his name and reputation have become involved in an investigation.

Condon, director of the national bureau of standards, gave the senate rules committee his endorsement of a bill by Senator Lucas (D., Ill.), the senate majority leader. The bill would permit a person suffering adverse criticism in a congressional inquiry to be heard and to cross-examine witnesses having testified against him.

In his statement Condon cited his own experience with the house committee on Un-American activities. He said during most of 1947 (there appeared at frequent intervals unfriendly newspaper articles about me attributed to committee sources saying that I was about to be investigated by the committee and implying that sinister revelations were soon to be made.)

Finally, he said, a subcommittee report was issued on March 1, 1948, "exclusively devoted to an attempt to support the portable contention that I was untrustworthy and unfit for public office." In that report the subcommittee called Dr. Condon "one of the weakest links" in the nation's atomic security.

Condon, who denied this at the time, said the committee never has given him a hearing or amplified its report.

Czech Reds Say Beran Supplant

Prague, July 20 (AP)—The controlled press claimed today that the government-sponsored Catholic action movement had supplanted Archbishop Josef Beran and his bishops as the spokesman for Czechoslovakia's Roman Catholics.

This claim, advanced in the newspaper Lidova Demokracie, indicated the government was preparing to by-pass the isolated bishops and deal directly with the separatist organization.

In that way the government could obtain "Catholic approval" for the proposed new law for control of the churches and also a new state-church agreement dictated on government terms.

Archbishop Beran and his hierarchy had been fighting against both these measures. They had fought particularly against a proposed state-church agreement which, they contended, was "a dictate and not an agreement" and which would "enslave" the Catholic church here.

But now Archbishop Beran, isolated and under police surveillance in his palace here for the last month, appears to have been effectively silenced. Most

of his bishops are reported in similar position.

Archbishop Beran and the Vatican have branded the government-sponsored Catholic action "schismatic," and leaders of the separatist group have been excommunicated.

Moscow Watches Atlantic Pact Debate

Moscow, July 20 (AP)—The U.S. senate debate on the North Atlantic pact has been getting close attention from the Moscow press.

Here are a few recent sample headlines which appeared in Pravda, the official communist party newspaper:

"American public comes out against pact."

"Senate discusses Atlantic pact." (This story told of growing opposition among senators to the charter.)

"Sen. (William E.) Jenner (R., Ind.) quoted as saying pact a military alliance not for peace but for unleashing war."

Other Soviet newspapers also have been giving the debate steady play.

Tax Receipts Drop \$1.4 Billion

Washington, July 20 (AP)—The treasury department said today tax collections for the year ending June 30 totaled \$40,448,498,370, a drop of \$1,416,043,925 from the \$41,864,542,295 of the preceding 12 months.

Populous New York, as usual led all states by paying a total of \$7,367,802,709. This amount, however, was \$607,711,007 less than the state's 1948 federal tax bill of \$7,975,513,716.

The individual income tax collections, including tax withheld by employers, represented the government's largest single source of revenue—\$18,029,745,504 this year compared to \$20,997,780,699 in the last 12-month period.

Corporation income and profits taxes were \$11,568,383,478 (\$10,174,409,833); employment taxes \$2,475,880,012 (\$2,381,342,352) and miscellaneous internal revenue, \$8,374,389,374 (\$8,311,009,409).

The totals for other states (1948 figures in brackets) included: Oregon, \$298,269,485 (\$316,843,555); Washington (including Alaska), \$505,215,967 (\$533,126,028).

New Heat Wave Spreads in East

Chicago, July 20 (AP)—More hot weather is in prospect today for wide areas from the Rockies into the southeastern states.

Temperatures of above 100 are forecast for parts of Oklahoma and in the 90s for most of the southwest. The mercury touched 103 at Wichita, Kans., yesterday and was in the 90s over much of the Great Plains and eastern Rockies. Highs of 100 were general in northern Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Chadron, Nebr., and Fort Smith, Ark., each reported readings of 100.

Temperatures are near normal over the Great Lakes region and the northwest Pacific states and slightly above normal in the eastern states.

Rain spots today included the central Mississippi valley and the northern plains. A heavy rain hits areas in northwest Pennsylvania last night causing a flash flood in one area.
