A tray of sherbet in the freezing compartment of your refrigerator will solve many summer menu problems. Cooling and refreshing, it is the perfect ending for warm weather meals. A tablespoon of sherbet adorning a dish of berries or other fresh fruit is delicious and attractive. Those long, cool drinks, made with ginger ale or sparkling water, are even better topped with a scoop of sherbet.

Here's a delightful sherbet cooling as a long drink and tangy of flavor, made with ginger ale.

- Gingerale Sherbet**
- 1 cup water
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin
 - 2 tablespoons cold water
 - 1/2 cup lemon juice
 - 1 cup pineapple juice
 - 1 1/2 cups pale dry ginger ale
 - 2 egg whites

Combine 1 cup water with 1/4 cup sugar. Boil for 10 minutes. Sprinkle gelatin on 2 tablespoons cold water; then add to the hot sugar syrup; stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice, pineapple juice and ginger ale. Pour into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator with temperature control at coldest setting; freeze until firm about 1-inch in from edge of tray. Beat egg whites stiff; add remaining 1/4 cup sugar, while continuing to beat. Beat sherbet with fork, fold in beaten egg white mixture. Return to tray. Freeze until firm. Yield: 8 servings.

A tasty warm-weather sandwich filling is made my softening a small package of cream cheese, seasoning it with a little onion juice, and mixing it well with about a half out of finely chopped watercress.
