Spellman Hits At Mrs. FDR

New York, July 22 (AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman criticized Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt today for her opposition to federal aid for parochial and private schools.

In a letter to the former first lady, the Catholic prelate said "Your record of anti-Catholicism stands for all to see—a record which you yourself wrote on the pages of history which cannot be recalled—documents of discrimination unworthy of an American mother."

The cardinal's attack was based on articles written by Mrs. Roosevelt in her column "My Day."

Mrs. Roosevelt's secretary said at Hyde Park that the letter had not yet been received and that there would be no comment until after its arrival, if then. Cardinal Spellman made the letter public. He wrote that, after Mrs. Roosevelt's first column on the Barden bill June 23, he had intended ignoring it.

"But, as the days passed and in two subsequent columns you continued your anti-Catholic campaign, I became convinced that it was in the interest of all Americans and the cause of justice itself that your misstatements should be challenged."

Federal aid to education is one of the hottest issues now before congress.

Jobless Aid for Vets Continues

Washington, July 22 (AP)—The senate labor committee today voted unanimously to keep for another year the "52-20" program of unemployment benefits to veterans.

The present program expires next Monday. President Truman has asked that it be continued.

Under the program, unemployed veterans receive government payments of up to \$20 a week for 52 weeks. About 600,000 veterans now are getting them.

The committee's action sends on to the senate a bill which would keep the program in force. Both senate and house must approve it for the program to continue.

Backers of a similar measure in the house are pessimistic about extension of the law. The bill is before the house veterans committee. The chairman, Rep. Rankin (D-Miss) has said it is going to stay there. He has called the "52-20" benefits "sit down money and rocking chair money."

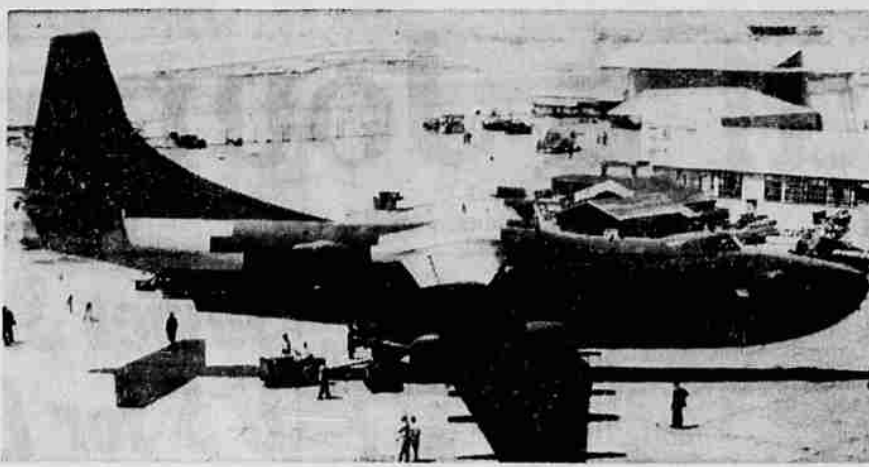

Board to Avert Railroad Strike

Washington, July 22 (AP)—President Truman today appointed a three-member emergency board to investigate a labor dispute between the Southern Pacific railroad and employees represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

He named Robert G. Simmons, a member of the supreme court of Nebraska; Frank M. Swacker, New York attorney; and Leverett Edwards, a member of the state industrial commission of Oklahoma.

The dispute involves the proper make-up of train crews. The union called a strike today, but a walkout was averted when Mr. Truman intervened earlier this week under the railway labor act and announced he was creating the emergency board.

Under the law, there can be no walkout until 30 days after the board reports.

Heroic Engineer of SP at Death's Door

Montebello, Calif., July 22 (AP)—A heroic engineer who brought his steam locomotive through a seething wall of flames is near death today.

The driver of the gasoline truck hit by the train died last night. He was Harry G. Heaton, of Bell, Calif.

The engineer, M. E. Byers, 54, Las Vegas, Nev., was credited by officers with saving some 150 passengers by staying at the controls and rolling the Union Pacific's "City of Los Angeles" through the flames, which roared several hundred feet high.

Cordon Votes 'No' on Pact

Washington, July 22 (AP)—Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) was the lone Pacific northwest senator to vote against approval of the North Atlantic pact yesterday.

Senators Cain (R) and Magnuson (D) of Washington and Morse (R) of Oregon voted with the majority.

On amendments, all of which were beaten, the lineup differed. All northwest senators opposed a reservation by Senator Watkins (D-Utah) that would have made a congressional declaration of war optional rather than mandatory if a member of the pact was attacked. All also opposed another Watkins' proposal to deny an obligation on the part of this country to use armed forces without approval of congress.

A third reservation, which would have denied any obligation to give military aid, including the atomic bomb, found Senators Cain and Cordon voting approval with Magnuson and Morse opposed.

Cordon explained his vote against ratification of the treaty by saying it "would saddle us with a monstrous military load that we can't carry."

Opens Debate On Funds for ECA

Washington, July 22 (AP)—Senator Robertson (D., Va.), opened senate debate on foreign aid funds today with a plea to keep the Marshall plan going as a bar to Soviet expansion in Europe.

At issue is how much money the economic cooperation administration will get for recovery work in the year that began July 1.

Robertson told the Senate that the recovery plan in the last 15 months has "stopped Soviet expansion in Europe cold."

"It can keep it stopped in Europe next year and perhaps indefinitely if we carry on our program long enough to make Europe self-supporting."

Robertson did not ask specifically that the senate restore a 10 per cent cut in ECA funds made by the appropriations committee. But Walter Reuther, president of the CIO United Auto Workers, did.

Reuther said in a statement that the cut and other proposed changes would amount "to a major defeat for democracy and a major victory for totalitarianism."

The bill before the senate provides \$3,778,380,000 to carry the Marshall plan through its second year of operations.

This is 10 per cent less than the \$4,198,200,000 ECA administrator Paul G. Hoffman requested. It compares with the
