

Allan Carson Candidate For U. S. District Judge

Senator Allan G. Carson of Salem announced Saturday that he is a candidate for the new federal district judgeship proposed for Oregon by legislation pending at Washington.

Senator Carson has the unanimous endorsement of the Marion County Bar association and the individual endorsement of many attorneys individually in the county.

Tibet Ousts Chinese Envoys

Canton, China, July 23 (AP)—The Chinese government officials in the latest effort to smother Chinese influence in that remote land at the top of the world, qualified Canton sources reported tonight.

The Chinese nationalists claim suzerainty (a sort of feudal control not so definite as sovereignty) over Tibet.

A Chinese diplomatic mission a radio station and school long have been maintained at Lhasa, the remote capital in the Himalaya mountains.

Canton sources said that on July 7 the Tibetan state council—the lamas who rule in the name of the teen-age Dalai Lama—ordered all Chinese government personnel out of Tibet within two weeks.

The informants said the Chinese departed immediately for India. They hinted that British influence may have caused the Tibetan action, Britain and China long have vied for paramount position in the country.

10 Million in Slave Camps

Geneva, Switzerland, July 23 (AP)—The British government claims to have documentary proof that forced labor is an established legal policy of the Soviet government. It says it believes about 10,000,000 persons—10 percent of Russia's working population—are in forced labor camps.

The British delegate to the United Nations economic and social council, Corley Smith, yesterday made public a set of documents he said were laws and regulations covering the forced labor policy of the Soviet government.

The British published photostatic copies of what they claimed were the original Russian texts, running to 8500 words, plus full French and English translations.

These documents will form the basis of Britain's case against alleged Russian slave labor which is being investigated by the council under terms of an American motion approved last March 7.

One of the demands then was for a survey by a UN commission of conditions inside the Soviet union. Russia denounced this as a plot by Britain and America to get spies into her territory.

Previous attempts to bring the slave labor question to a head have been stymied by Russian assertions that there was no forced labor in the Soviet union and that western claims to that effect were "imperialistic propaganda."

The British are reported to feel that these documents will now force the Russians to make more definite action than a mere shrugging off the charges.

Denny stepped off a transcontinental plane yesterday and handed the beans to a representative from the Mayor's office. Mayor Curley is out of town and was unable to personally greet Denny.

Then city greeter Louis J. Brems handed Denny a two-quart brown pot of "Boston baked beans—the best in the world."

Denny grinned and said "Oh, gee." Despite the coaxing of his mother, Mrs. A. J. Frank who accompanied him, he was unable to say anything else.

Brems outlined Denny's Boston visit as the mayor's office had planned it. First Denny visited the governor's office where he presented a woolen blanket to J. John Fox, personal secretary to Gov. Paul A. Dever.

This morning Denny was up early for a sightseeing tour of Boston's historic spots.

But the best thing on the program, Denny said, was the ball game between the Boston Braves and the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Denny will enplane tomorrow for the return trip.

NLRB Hearing On Canneries

Whether the national labor relations board will order an election to determine whether refrigeration employees of three Salem canneries are to have their own craft unit is the subject of a hearing that has been in progress here for three days.

The hearing is being conducted by H. J. Merrick of Seattle as hearing officer for the NLRB.

About 12 employees in the Kelley-Farquhar, the Blue Lake cannery, and the United Growers are involved. They are now members of the Cannery Workers' union, an affiliate of the Teamsters. The International Union of Operating Engineers has petitioned for the election, which would also determine what is the proper unit for collective bargaining for the workers involved.

Representing the operating engineers are Clifford D. O'Brien of Seattle and Ben Anderson of Portland, attorneys. Representing the canneries is W. J. Linford, and representing the Cannery Workers' union is E. S. Benjamin.

Bulb Concern to Have Hearing Aug. 1

Portland, July 23 (AP)—License renewal of the Sherwood Bulb Gardens and its affiliated \$1,500,000 nursery organizations will be up for a hearing in Salem August 1.

The state department of agriculture's plant industry chief, Frank McKenney, said yesterday complaints against the firm had prompted refusal of a renewal of the company's license.

Leslie E. Marcus, operator of the companies, had asked for licenses for the Sherwood Bulb Gardens, Sherwood; Coast Bulb company, Albina; Six Corners Gardens, Sherwood; Country Gardens, Beaverton, and Country Stores, Portland.

'Joe Palooka' Hero Adjudged Father

Worcester, Mass., July 23 (AP)—Handsome R. Joseph Kirkwood, Jr., 28, hero of the "Joe Palooka" movies, was adjudged the father of illegitimate twins Friday and agreed to make a cash settlement with the mother for their support.

Despite attempts to shield the Hollywood actor and golfer from unfavorable publicity, court papers certified that he had fathered the twin sons of Miss Florence C. Heppenstall, a theater cashier, six years ago.

Mills Told to End Pollution

Portland, July 23 (AP)—The state sanitary authority has set December 31, 1951, as the deadline for five Willamette valley pulp and paper mills to stop polluting the river. The alternative is to shut down their plants.

The deadline voted last night was set to coincide with the expected completion of a new \$15,000,000 sewage disposal system for the city of Portland.

Members of the authority also reloaded their legal guns to hurry valley towns along on the job of installing other municipal sewage purification plants.

Mills affected by the decision are the West Linn and Lebanon plants of the Crown Zellerbach Corp.; Publishers' Pulp and Paper company at Oregon City; Spaulding Pulp and Paper company at Newberg and the Oregon Pulp and Paper company at Salem.

Attorney General George Neuner attended the session and was asked to review the written pollution abatement orders before they are issued to the five industrial mills.

Sanitary Engineer Curtis M. Everts, Jr., said there no longer exists a valid reason for delaying installation of equipment that will purify liquid wastes now being dumped into the rivers.

Blaine Hallock reminded the authority members they might as well expect a court test of the anti-pollution regulatory law.

Crew on Disabled Vessel Rescued

Astoria, Ore., July 23 (AP)—All four crew members of a 48-foot fishing vessel which struck rocks and sank at the mouth of the Columbia river were safe at the Cape Disappointment life boat station today after they abandoned ship, the coast guard reported.

The craft was valued at \$10,000.

Freight Rate Cut On Oil Denied

Washington, July 23 (AP)—The Union Pacific railroad has been turned down for the third time by the interstate commerce commission on a request for authority to cut petroleum freight rates between Salt Lake City and the Pacific northwest.

The ICC refused to vacate an order suspending until the end of the year a revised plan submitted by the railroad for reducing trainload and single car charges.

Further investigation is due, however, on the proposed rate revisions. Five members of the 11-man commission favored vacating the suspension order on certain conditions relating to large quantities of petroleum products handled as a single shipment.

The Union Pacific filed a petition for rate cuts several months ago after the Standard Oil Co. had proposed construction of a petroleum pipeline between Salt Lake City and the northwest.

Tracy Snelling Gets Prison Term

Santa Fe, N. M., July 23 (AP)—Ex-Naval Officer Tracy Snelling, public relations director at the nearby Los Alamos atomic project until his strange week-long disappearance, faced a term of one year to 18 months in prison today for embezzling Red Cross funds.

The 37-year-old suspended atomic energy commission employee pleaded guilty to embezzlement of \$1,008 in Red Cross funds collected as chairman of a fund-raising drive in Los Alamos when brought before District Judge Louis Armijo yesterday.

Snelling, a decorated navy lieutenant commander in the Philippines during World War II, stood rigidly at attention when he was sentenced and told he will be taken soon to the New Mexico state penitentiary a short distance away through the streets of old Santa Fe.

The official, whose disappearance touched off a four-state search which did not end until he suddenly turned up at FBI headquarters in Dallas last Wednesday, related morosely that he took the Red Cross money because of many family troubles.

He was paid \$8500 a year in the Los Alamos post, but he had only \$1.25 when arrested. He could not raise the \$5000 bond.
