Third Secret Atomic Meeting

Washington, July 27 (AP)—The nation's top state, military and congressional policy makers sat down again today to discuss how the nation will conduct its foreign relations in the atomic energy field.

The questions before the group reportedly involve the sharing of U.S. atomic knowledge with Great Britain and Canada, and assurance that this nation will conduct its foreign relations in the atomic energy field.

The United States now is largely dependent upon Great Britain and Canada for its supplies of uranium—the fissionable material that goes into atomic weapons.

Today's meeting, the third to be held on the international problem started shortly before noon (Pacific daylight time).

Secretary of State Acheson, Secretary of Defense Johnson and David E. Lilienthal, chairman of the atomic energy commission, were seated together, facing Chairman McMahon (D-Conn.) of the joint senate-house atomic committee.

General Dwight Eisenhower, who attended the previous conferences at Blair House July 14, and the Capitol hill session a week ago, was absent.

14,000 Seamstresses In Paris on Strike

Paris, July 27 (AP)—France's fashion industry was hit today by a strike of 14,000 seamstresses.

The girls are asking boosts of from 15 to 30 francs (four to nine cents) an hour in their wages, which vary from 60 to 95 francs hourly (18 to 28 cents).

First indications were that the strike would not halt the fall fashion showings, about to get under way. Most of the new clothes are ready.

Urge Yankees To Quit China

Washington, July 27 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson said today that Americans remaining in China face the danger of being treated as hostages by the communists.

He told a news conference that Ambassador J. Leighton Stuart, in preparing to return to the United States for consultations, has run into numerous difficulties put in his way by communist authorities at Nanking.

Acheson also said the State department has been advised that Randall Gould, editor of the American-owned Shanghai Evening Post and Mercury, has been held since noon yesterday (Shanghai time) without food, water or sleep by newspaper plant workers as the result of a labor dispute.

This instance was used by the secretary in a general discussion of the China situation, which he said reinforced repeated U.S. official pleas that American citizens leave that country if possible.

Latest state department records list 5023 Americans still in China. Of these 1140 are in the British crown colony of Hong Kong.

Protests Senate Slurs on Lie

Lake Success, July 27 (AP)—Byron Price, acting secretary-general of the United Nations, has protested officially to Secretary of State Acheson against "irresponsible and unfounded attacks on the integrity of the secretariat," the UN announced today.

The UN made public a letter written yesterday by Price to Acheson.

Price called attention to announcement of the senate judiciary subcommittee which said that a mystery witness had testified the UN staff under Secretary-General Trygve Lie is terrorized by communist agents.

Price said that in making public the testimony the senate subcommittee has "misunderstood the basic principles on which the United Nations was founded, which principles were explicitly accepted by each member government when it acceded to the charter."

He said the general assembly of the UN constantly keeps check on the acts of the secretary-general and that the internal administration of the secretariat is the responsibility of the secretary-general and of the assembly.

Price, former director of censorship for the United States during the second World War, is serving as acting secretary-general while Lie is in Norway on vacation. When the subcommittee announcement came last Saturday he called the whole thing the "nuttiest" story he had heard.

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Additional Sports Injured Henrich Homers; Feller Yanked by Tribe

New York, July 27 (AP)—Tommy Henrich, who suffered a broken toe Monday night, hit a home run with two mates on base in the first inning of today's crucial game involving the New York Yankees and the second place Cleveland Indians, three games behind.

When Henrich's injury was discovered yesterday it was announced he would be out from five to seven days.

The veteran infielder-outfielder's hit was the big blow of the Yankees' four run first inning that sent Bobby Feller, Indian starter, to the showers without retiring a man. Ed Lopat started for the Yankees.

Gene Woodling and Phil Rizzuto singled ahead of Henrich's homer.

More than 65,000 paying fans sweltered in Yankee stadium.

Six-Day Week for Portland Bank

Portland, July 27 (AP)—The First National Bank of Portland and its city branches will remain open until 5 p.m. six days a week, President F. N. Belgrano, Jr., said the longer banking hours may be extended to its branches in other Oregon towns. He said employees will be on a five-day work week, with rotating days off.

As far as the three Salem banks are concerned there is no immediate proposal that they will operate until 5 o'clock each afternoon on a six-day basis, thus following out a program adopted by the First National of Portland and its branches in that city. However, managers in each local banking institution said that if conditions demanded longer hours a change would be forthcoming.

Banks in Salem now operate from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. except Saturday when the doors are closed at noon.

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To Draft New Farm Program

Washington, July 27 (AP)—Farm-minded senators agreed today to try to draft a new federal farm program and push it through the present session of congress.

Chairman Elmer Thomas (D., Okla.), said the senate agriculture committee directed a seven-man subcommittee headed by Senator Anderson (D., N.M.), to draft the new farm bill. The decision was reached at a second and consecutive closed-door session.

Both democrats and republicans on the committee agreed that the new proposal ignored most proposals of Secretary of Agriculture Brannan.

Instead, they reported general agreement upon this program:

1. Retention of relatively high level government price supports for the so-called basic commodities: Corn, wheat, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts. Most senators were said to favor fixed supports at 90 per cent of parity if farmers approve planting and marketing controls.

2. Use of a flexible price support program for meats, dairy products, fruits and other so-called non-basic and perishable farm products. Under this the level of government supports could be raised or lowered in an attempt to control production.

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Truman Picks 3 for Top Jobs

Washington, July 27 (AP)—Highly placed White House officials said today that President Truman has picked men to fill three key jobs in the military establishment.

They added, however, that he is still trying to find men for the important chairmanships of the munitions board and of the national security resources board.

These sources, unquotable by name, said Mr. Truman plans to nominate Tracy Voorhees, now an assistant secretary, for under-secretary of the army.

This nomination, they added, likely will be accompanied by that of Archibald Alexander, unsuccessful democratic candidate for the U.S. senate from New Jersey last year, to be an assistant secretary of the army.

The third important post was listed for Marx Leva, special assistant and general counsel to Secretary of Defense Johnson. Leva is slated to become an assistant secretary of the department of defense under unification legislation for which Mr. Truman is pressing congress.

Meanwhile, White House sources said that Ward Canaday, Toledo, Ohio, manufacturer, is balking at becoming chairman of the munitions board.

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Lewis Rejects New Proposal

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., July 7 (AP)—John L. Lewis today rejected an offer of northern and western soft coal operators for two-year extension of his present contract in exchange for dropping the three-day work week.

The mine owners offered to give Lewis the same terms and conditions until March 31, 1951. These include a provision that the miners work only when they are "able and willing."

The union described the offer as "ridiculous."

With the rejection of the operators' offer, negotiations between United Mine Workers and the northern and western soft coal men recessed until August 11.

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Eugene Girl Dies At Beach Camp
