Quick Cream Biscuits Ingredients: 2 cups sifted cake flour, 4 teaspoons baking pow-der, ½ teaspoon salt, 1 table-spoon sugar, 1 cup less 2 tablepoons heavy cream.

Method: Mix and sift the cake flour, baking powder and salt. Pour in the cream and mix vigorously with a wooden spoon until dough forms. Flatten out until dough forms.
