New York, Aug. 10 (AP)—A recovery movement rolled steadily onward today in the stock market chalking up gains of fractions to nearly 2 points. The volume of trading accelerated on the rise and hit a rate of around 1,500,000 for the entire day.

Rails and oils led the upward movement. Air lines also were active and leaders were unchanged to fractions higher.

Allegany preferred was up more than 2 points at one time at a new high, and United Corp. sold in large blocks unchanged at 4.

Stocks on the higher side included Superior Oil of California, Barnsdall Oil, Santa Fe, Cerro de Pasco, Kennecott, U.S. Steel, Sears Roebuck, United Aircraft, United Air Lines, Zenith and Philco.

Nut Growers Get Hearing

Filbert growers of the Pacific Northwest, faced with a record crop this year, have asked for and have been granted a hearing by U. S. Department of Agriculture officials in an attempt to establish a marketing agreement effective October 1st.

August 15th, 16th and 17th have been set as dates for the hearing, in the auditorium of the New Journal Building, 800 S. W. Front St., Portland. It will convene each day at 9:30 a. m. (Daylight Time).

Proposed by Northwest Nut Growers, Dundee, marketing agent for seven cooperative associations in Oregon and Washington, and endorsed by other packers in the filbert industry, the agreement recommends that a Control Board be established to function as authority in determining percentages of merchantable grade in-shell filbert tonnage that would be marketed as such in each crop year.

Walnut growers have marketed under a similar program for many years. Maintenance of control on the in-shell tonnage offered to market in relation to the yearly demand, is reported as a large factor in maintaining a healthy, progressive walnut industry.

Under the proposed filbert agreement, surplus tonnage of the merchantable grade in-shell filberts would be diverted to marketing as shelled filbert kernels, export sales, or other market diversion. Tonnage going into these channels would be optional to the handler, but the total, diverted into one or all, would equal his surplus percentage reported to the Control Board.

W. V. Fuller, 88, Dies at Dallas

Dallas, Ore., Aug. 10—W. V. Fuller, 88, widely known authority on forestry and former state legislator, died here about 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. He was a specialist on Polk county fair board and chamber of commerce.

Fuller helped organize the Polk and Lincoln county fire protection districts and was a director in both associations. He won state-wide recognition as a director of publicity for the state board of forestry and originated the "showboat" in 1926 which toured the state in the interest of forest lands.

He was a joint representative from Polk and Lincoln counties in the legislature during the 1917 and 1925 sessions and represented Polk county in 1919. He had served as president of the Dallas city council, was a member of the Polk county fair board and was on the city council in 1908.

During the first World War he was a chairman of the Polk county council of defense. Fuller was born in West Union, Ia., January 10, 1861, and was married to Eliza Stewart in Albert Lea, Minn., in 1881.

For 15 years he was identified with the timber interests and logging in Minnesota and one of his first jobs was with a Mississippi river log drive. He later was connected with construction on the first railroad in Canada west of Winnipeg.

Lured by tales of the Oregon timber he came to this state in 1901 and proved up on a timber claim in the Siletz basin. Between 1909 and 1925 he operated the Fuller Pharmacy here.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Eliza Stewart Fuller; only child, Mrs. Oscar Hayter and three grandchildren, all of Dallas. Announcements later from the Henkle and Bollman funeral home.
