persons in April and carried a \$197,000,000 monthly payroll.
The census bureau, reporting this today, called it a record both in numbers and in pay.
Compared with 12 months earlier, the number of jobholders was up 6.1 percent or 56,000.
The payroll itself was up \$25.

The payroll itself was up \$25. 700,000 a month or 15 percent for the period, largely because average pay went up from \$185 a month in April 1948 to \$200

last April. State governments now have "nearly half as many employes as the federal government, and about one-third as many em-ployes as all local governments combined," the bureau said.

Michigan was the only state listed by the bureau as not having an increase in payrolls in the 12 months ended last April.


