Rev. Bohl came to Salem from Hood River four years ago last April. The resignation was submitted more than two weeks ago and this week was accepted by the local board.

A recent election of the National Association of Evangelicals here for Salem resulted in him becoming president of that organization. He has been very active in Christian Youth effort for the Salem area. As a member of the Salem Academy Board he was chosen for chairman of the educational committee.

He has not announced his plans for the future.
