Seattle, Sept. 21 (AP)—Despite a bag that held a Grizzly, a brown bear and three mountain goats, two Seattle men were undecided today whether they were the hunters or the hunted during a jaunt into the Tweedsmuir park area 300 miles northwest of Vancouver, B.C.
