

Stock Advance Led by Railroads

New York, Sept. 22 (AP)—Demand for railways stocks dominated a rising market today.

Gains in the carrier group ranged to an extreme of 3 points but most advanced around a point or less.

Railroad issues replaced utilities as trading favorites early in the day and retained their popularity. Plus signs were liberally sprinkled over most other groups.

Business expanded when interest in rails picked up and latter added new momentum following announcement that steel workers would extend operations to Oct. 1 as requested by the president.

Trading was active with turnover at the rate of around 1,300,000 shares for the full session.

Santa Fe jumped more than 3 points at one time.

Also ahead were Southern Pacific, Frisco, Consolidated Edison, Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, Douglas Aircraft, American Smelting, Dow Chemical and U.S. Gypsum.

Wheat Futures Show Strength

Chicago, Sept. 22 (AP)—Wheat futures prices strengthened in late trading today, largely reflecting firm prices in the Kansas City and Minneapolis futures markets.

September contracts of grains and lard moved erratically, since today was the last day for trading in September futures. Any September contracts remaining outstanding after the close of trading today must be settled by delivery of the actual grain.

Wheat closed 3/4 to 1 1/4 higher, September \$2.10 1/2-\$2.11, oats were 3/4 to 1 1/4 up, September 87 1/2-88, rye was 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, September \$1.40, soybeans were 1 1/2 to 2 cents down, November \$2.25 1/4, and lard was 3 to 26 cents a hundred pounds lower, September \$1.00.
