QUESTION: A young friend of my son's drove up into the hills on a fishing trip a cou-ple of weeks ago. He left a ple of weeks ago. He left a valuable rifle and some ex-pensive fishing gear in his parked car while he fished along the banks of a stream. When he returned, he found when he returned, he found the car had been broken into and the rifle, fishing gear and some other items stolen. He was not insured so he had to stand the loss. However, I have a theft policy and I'd like to know if it would pro-tect me in a similar situation.
