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Nationalists

As yet, Hong Kong has heard no reports of nationalist resistance. Instead, 80,000 government troops in the Canton region face isolation by encircling Reds and by insufficient shipping to escape to the sea.

The British massed troops near the border separating British Kowloon territory and China proper, but they did not expect trouble. The nationalist government fled to Chungking. Acting President Li Tsung-Jen left by plane for Kweilin in neighboring Kiangsi province where an army of some 250,000 has been salvaged out of recent setbacks.

Li has been feuding with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, and there was speculation that he might not go on to the new refugee capital.

Nesblitt Promoted—Joseph Nesblitt, who has been field representative for the division of foods and dairies, state department of agriculture, has been promoted to rank of dairy specialist working out of headquarters in Salem. Nesblitt has been assigned to the ice cream and fluid milk fields to help relieve the load of statewide supervision for programs covering application of ice cream standards and fluid milk regulations. Marvin D. Mikkelsen of Eugene has been named to succeed Nesblitt in Lane and Douglas counties.

Cold Snap Hits Northern Area

(By the Associated Press)
A cold snap struck the Pacific northwest today (Thursday), dropping temperatures well below freezing in many areas.

The mercury plummeted to 14 degrees at Both Bend, Ore., and Butte, Mont., this morning—lowest readings recorded by the weather bureau.

At Prineville, Ore., where the unofficial thermometer also marked 14, potato digging was halted until the sun warmed the fields and ended the danger of potatoes freezing on the ground.

Much of the rest of the northwest was chilly, too: 16 degrees at Madras, 18 at Baker, 19 at Redmond, 22 at La Grande. Seattle recorded a low of 36, Spokane 30, Portland 38, Yakima 26, Ellensburg 25, Bellingham 23, Omak 24, Walla Walla 35, Everett 38.

Other minimums: Eugene 33, Roseburg 37, Medford 31, Lakeview 27, Bend 41, Ontario 38, Salem 35, The Dalles 34.

More cold was forecast for tomorrow.
