Brave Junior decided Johnny Brown in four heats in the lightweight division. Junior, a hard hitter, sent Brown reeling as the gong sounded the end of the second and again in the fourth had Brown on the floor for a count of nine.

A badly damaged nose caused Joe Pack of Salem to drop out of his engagement with Tony Dacca in the second round of the first preliminary. Dacca, considerably younger, had the edge throughout.

Rumor Portland to Drop Playoff for Seattle Mix

(By the Associated Press) Rumor of a post-season meeting between city high school football champions of Portland and Seattle were disclosed in the Oregon city Tuesday night and promptly denied in Seattle.

The report was published in the Prep Patter column of the Oregonian. The newspaper said Portland schools are thinking of dropping out of the annual Oregon title playoff because the sponsoring Oregon High School

Activities Association takes a 75 per cent cut of the receipts. It had been suggested, the report continued, that Portland and Seattle teams tangle in a post-season clash each year. The two top teams would meet in one city and the runners-up in the two leagues meeting in the other.

In Seattle, Athletic Director Leon Brigham described the proposal as "news to me," but followed that up by saying that "such a plan has been rejected by the Seattle school administration."

"We have our annual Thanksgiving day game here and we feel obligated to bring one of the best teams from the state here to play the Seattle champion."
