## Births Increase Deaths Decrease

Births in Marion county during the first 10 months of 1949 exceeded those of a similar period last year by 50, according to the October report of the department of health. The figures for the two periods are 2031 and 1975.

During October births totaled 201 with female babies outnumbering males 106 to 95. Seventy seven of the mothers were residents of Salem and 36 were from outside of Marion county.

Deaths during the 10 months period were 663, a decline of 11 over a similar period in 1948. For October deaths numbered 73. There were four deaths of infants under one year of age.

Heart disease was charged with 20 deaths, apoplexy 16 and cancer 12. There were no deaths due to automobile accidents and for the 10 months period there were only five, a decrease of 12 over 1948.

There were 22 deaths from communicable disease during the 10 months period: nine from tuberculosis, five from lobar pneumonia, two each from Hodgkin's disease and poliomyelitis and one each from diphtheria, influenza and syphilis.

The prediction is for dense fog to settle in the area south of Portland starting early this evening and continuing through to about noon, Saturday, and another blanket of the stuff due again Saturday night.

The fog drifted in over the Salem section early Thursday evening and had not lifted by noon Friday. Temperatures continue cold, the minimum registering 35 degrees, Friday, three above freezing point. The same minimum is due tonight.

Ivan Houser, noted sculptor, will lecture before the public meeting in the Elfstrom Art Galleries, Saturday, 10:30 a.m. This is a part of a series of demonstrations and lectures which Larry Boulter has been sponsoring weekly in the interest of the public.

Arrangements for the three sales will be made by Watts during the Thanksgiving holidays with the first to be held at the state fairgrounds February and the others at La Grande and Prineville.

Three animals or pens of singles will be exhibited at a market hog show in Portland in April with Kraus heading a committee on arrangements. General conditions of the Pacific International livestock exposition in Portland will be taken up with Halter Holt, manager, by a committee headed by McKinley. Conditions at the state fair were also discussed. Swine breeders believe that a day in addition to the three now taken up by judging, might be desirable for the "PI."

Breeders exhibiting at the two big fall fairs expressed preference for Guy McReynolds of Nebraska State college or Dr. J. S. Coffey, Ohio State university, for the state fair and either Bill Neufeld, of the Swift company of Chicago or Elmer Hughes of the California State agricultural college at Davis.

## Father Held on Morals Charge

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## Zoning Parley By Planners

No set program has been prepared for the three-party zoning conference being held Friday afternoon at City hall.

Participants will be the Salem planning and zoning commission, the Salem long-range planning commission, and the state capitol planning commission.

The conference was called by Robert White, chairman of the city planning and zoning commission. He called it mainly because of opposition by the state commission against further encroachments of business and industrial operations in the area of the state capitol buildings.

The policy of the state commission, which is an advisory body only, was set out in a lengthy report several weeks ago, signed by Robert Sawyer of Bend as chairman of the commission. It has, however, been stressed since that time in various ways, including a letter to the city council last Monday night from the Oregon Society of Landscape Architects which supported the position of the state capitol commission.

Off-street parking in the capitol area may also come in for discussion.

Before the three-party meeting, which started at 2 o'clock, the state commission met at 1 o'clock for a business session.

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
