

Oregon Sheriffs Convention Discuss Warrant Problems

Twenty-five of the 36 sheriffs of the state were present Thursday morning at opening sessions of the 23rd annual Oregon State Sheriffs' convention, holding its main session at American Legion building, 2650 S. Commercial street, to hear an address of welcome from County Judge Grant Murphy which officially opened the two-day meeting.

White Funeral Set for Friday

Funeral services will be held at the W. T. Rigdon chapel Friday morning at 11 a.m. for William Nelson White, owner of White's Radio and Appliance shop, who died at his residence Wednesday morning. Rev. Louis C. Kirby will officiate at the service.

White, who was born June 20, 1882, at Charles City, Iowa, came to Salem from Hermiston, Oregon, about six years ago, and established a radio repair shop here. He first located in the Hollywood district then moved his business to its present location at 480 North Church street.

An employee of the telephone and telegraph companies for about 30 years before entering the radio repair business, White, when he left Iowa, moved to Kent, Wash., arriving there in 1905. He was married in 1916, at Tacoma, Wash., to Victoria S. Oliver, who survives him. From Washington the couple moved to Needles, Calif., and then to Oregon about 15 years ago. He attended the Methodist church.

Surviving besides the wife is a daughter, Mrs. Richard F. Fox of Salem.

Idahna Election Order Denied

Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell has declined to issue an injunction to stop the election called for December 9 on the proposed incorporation of Idahna and has sustained a demurrer to the complaint in the case of Ed Vickers against the Marion county court and County Clerk Harlan Judd seeking to enjoin the holding of such an election. The court holds plaintiff Vickers is without legal capacity to sue.

Possibility of an appeal is likely in case speedy action can be gained from the supreme court. From the fact that Senator Thomas Mahoney, one of the attorneys for Vickers, insisted on a court reporter sitting in on proceedings recently in the case is indicative of the fact an appeal is contemplated.

Judge Kimmell in his findings asserts that it is not alleged in the complaint, nor does it appear, that the statute under which the election was called is void or that such election is without authority of law.

Based on the foregoing, the court states, a court of equity will not enjoin the holding of an election at the suit of an individual taxpayer. Senator Allan Carson, who appeared at the hearing for the defendants, had contended that Vickers, as a taxpayer, could not legally institute the suit, that it was essential to establish jurisdiction that the suit be instituted in the name of the state through the district attorney.

The morning session was mainly devoted to discussion of various problems facing the office of sheriff with stress being laid at this morning's meeting on the handling of distress warrants issued by the state tax commission for collection of delinquent income taxes which comes under the purview of the duties of the sheriff.

Misunderstanding and lack of information, it was stated, have caused undue difficulties in this line of work and a representative of the state tax commission was on hand to clarify the situation and work a more definite program in handling the warrants.

Another topic that arose in the general discussions was a bill introduced in the last legislature by Senator Austin Flegel which would have stripped the sheriffs of the state of all law enforcement duties and possibility of its reappearance at some subsequent session. It was pointed out that law enforcement is furnished by the sheriffs at the cheapest rate of any such enforcement and that sheriffs have been and are cooperating with state police and other enforcement agencies and desired to work out a closer bond of cooperation, if possible. Means of meeting any more such attacks should they come up were discussed.

The sheriffs had lunch Thursday at the state penitentiary while the ladies had a luncheon at the Senator hotel.

Afternoon sessions are being held in the penitentiary dining room where a general discussion was followed by a talk by George Hahn of the state bureau of identification, this also being subject of discussion by the visitors. A trip through the penitentiary will wind up the first day's activities, the second day's session reconvening at veterans hall at 9:30 Friday morning.

Flegel Defends CVA Proposal

Prefacing his prepared talk with the assertion that he is "not a pink or a socialist" and that he "thinks as much of the capitalist and profit system" as anybody in the United States, Austin F. Flegel, of Portland, plunged into a defense of CVA during Thursday's luncheon of the Salem Lions club.

Flegel expressed regret that he "did not have time to go into the bill in detail" but just before concluding his remarks did attempt to answer some of the criticism directed against CVA.

The speaker accused the "power interests" of blocking development of electricity in the northwest and declared the "smear campaign" was directed from this source.

Flegel pointed to the need for jobs for the thousands of persons coming to Oregon and the northwest and intimated that only the CVA would be able to attract more industry to the Pacific coast.

There will be no "super state" under the CVA asserted Flegel.

'Goodwill Industries' Plan To Start Shop in Salem

Goodwill Industries, a non-profit organization, the aim of which is employing and rehabilitating the aged and the handicapped, is making plans now to start a Salem route.

The organization has four stores in Portland, employs 180 men and women in that area, and will each Friday come into Salem to collect articles that can be mended and resold. As soon as the route is built up enough they plan also to open a repair shop and office in Salem.

Goodwill collects used articles such as clothing, toys, books, furniture, bedding, dishes and cooking utensils, musical instruments, magazines, makes the necessary repairs and resells them. Salem persons having such articles can contact Mrs. M. Charboneau who is helping the organization get started in Salem. She can be reached by telephoning her at 2-8116 or 3-9762.

Money received from selling the articles is used in paying the handicapped or aged, who work in the shops in repairing the articles contributed or in paying those in the office, all of whom are handicapped or aged. Purpose of the program is to provide work for those individuals, who otherwise might be out of employment. Managing the organization is a volunteer board of business and professional men.

Goodwill now pays an average of \$17,000 in wages each month and of 180 persons regularly employed 93 per cent are physically handicapped or elderly persons considered unemployable by regular industry. Its program of training and rehabilitation depends entirely upon the public's contribution of materials and no financial support is received from any agency.

Harland Harmony Selmer, route 3, waived preliminary examination in district court Thursday on a charge of stealing a fur coat and was ordered held for the grand jury.

Bail on the charge was set at \$2000. The complaint against him accused him of stealing a fur coat belonging to Marie Henry, also of route 3.

Promoter Held on Vagrancy Charge

A man who advised several Salem women of a plan to set up a Turkish bath establishment in his apartment was sweating it out in the city jail Thursday under a vagrancy charge.

He was identified as Artis L. Rose, 2455 State, a recently discharged employee of the state hospital.

Police were advised that Rose had hoped to find a lucrative business in providing a place for young women to "sweat out" drunks.

He was quoted as saying he had learned the Turkish bath technique from a woman doctor in Texas.

Held to Grand Jury For Fur Coat Theft

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Atlantic Pact Nations Agree

Paris, Dec. 1 (AP)—The 12 Atlantic pact nations reached unanimous agreement tonight on a plan to defend themselves against any possible aggression by Russia.

A five-hour session resulted in an agreement that top military planners of the western world halled as the path to "international peace and security."

Immediately after the session U.S. Defense Secretary Louis Johnson left by air for Washington to take the plan to President Truman.

Approval by the president will release a billion dollars worth of military aid for Europe.

As the strongest nation in the five-power Brussels pact, Britain wants that group responsible for west European strategy. The U.S., dominant power of the 12-country Atlantic group, wants that alliance's high command to have the final say-so on all strategy.

The 12 defense ministers at today's meeting (starts at 8:30

a.m. EST) are expected to, resolve this difference and approve an integrated defense plan linking the U.S. and Canada with western Europe.

The plan when approved goes to President Truman. If it satisfies him, \$900,000,000 in U.S. military aid can be sent to Europe.

Details of the plan, worked out by the Atlantic powers' military leaders in long sessions in Washington and this week in Paris, are secret. In general, however, it divides the defense task in the entire Atlantic area among five overlapping regional groups. The U.S. and Canada form one unit.
