San Francisco, Dec. 6 (AP)—Lindy Berry, Texas Christian quarterback who ranked as one of the nation's best passers this season, will play for western team in the annual East-West football classic here Dec. 31.

Acceptance by Berry of an invitation to participate in the famed charity game for the Shriners' crippled children's hospital, was announced today by the selection committee.

Joining Berry will be one of his Texas Christian teammates, Don Narrell, giant tackle. Narrell stands 6 feet 4 inches and weighs 235 pounds.

Another lineman named today was Tom DeSylvia, Oregon State guard who weighs

215 pounds and stands 5 feet 11 inches.

Stars who accepted western invitations yesterday were tackle Steve Dotur, Oregon; Thurman McGraw, Colorado A. & M.; and Rollin Prather, Kansas State. Prather, a 6 foot 4 inch athlete, also can fill in at end.

The West squad to date also includes Southern Methodist's great Doak Walker, All American back; his team mate, Dick McKissick, also a back; Oregon State's all coast half-back, Ken Carpenter, and Tom Novak, University of Nebraska center.

New York, Dec. 5 (AP)—If you've ever wondered why hockey never fulfilled its promise of becoming a real big-league sport, Frank Boucher reluctantly admits it's because there aren't enough good players to go around. . . . that's not exactly the way Frank puts it, but he can pick out three to five players on each National league team he terms outstanding stars ("and no quotes, please; the other teams might get mad at me.") . . . and each team is carrying four or five players just good enough to hang on, who would be replaced if better players could be found. . . . if the league tried to expand, it would mean each team would have to carry more of these ineffectives. . . . I've been out west looking at amateurs, and the boys who are playing junior hockey look like juveniles," Boucher adds. "Even with 28 clubs to draw from, the minor league prospects aren't any better than the ones we have." . . . Frank blames the war for retarding the development of talent, but we're not so sure. . . . even in the old days there was just about enough material to give each club two good forward lines and four good defense men. But that was all they needed then.

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PCC Coaches Vote Four Bears on League Squad

Los Angeles, Dec. 6 — The coaches of the Pacific Coast Conference named four California Bears on their 1949 All-Conference team, and one each from seven other PCC institutions, it was announced today by the conference commissioner's office.

The four men from the champion Bears who rated first team honors were All-American Rod Franz at guard, tackles Jim Turner and Jim Cullom, and quarterback Bob Celery.

Voting was much closer for all positions than in the past two seasons, indicating that the distribution of talent in the PCC has leveled off considerably since the immediate post-war period.

Of the four California men chosen, two are repeaters from the 1948 team—Franz and Tur-

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
