Small College Mentor Defends All-Star Teams

Olean, N. Y., Dec. 9 (AP)—Most fans are quick to scorn the selection of All-America football teams as soon as their personal favorites are overlooked but not Hugh Devore, a smart gridiron guy who coaches St. Bonaventure college.
Devore, wartime touchdown mentor at Notre Dame, admits that it takes plenty of publicity to win "All" honors for a football player. Yet he points out that it requires consistently superlative performances to hit the headlines week in and week out.
If there is any fault with the system, he'll tell you, it is that only 11 men can be honored.
"There can't be much doubt that they deserve it," explained the square-cut man with the penetrating brown eyes. "Consider Doak Walker of Southern Methodist and Charley Justice of North Carolina."
Somebody pointed out that Walker was on the sidelines when SMU almost upset mighty Notre Dame as Kyle Rote carried the torch, and that when Justice was out of Carolina's battle against the fighting Irish a stand-in named Dick Bunting spearheaded the Tarheels so gallantly.
"Yes, but that's a case of suddenly drawing a hot hand—not one of being consistently great," Devore illustrated.

Commie Tactics May Halt Tennis International Play

London, Dec. 9 (AP)—Communist tactics in eastern Europe may halt world-wide international tennis, the president of the British Lawn Tennis association said today.

Viscount Templewood, in a speech prepared for the association's annual meeting, said western countries can't remain indifferent to the communist players' efforts to spread propaganda while playing in tournaments.

Lord Templewood is a former British foreign secretary and air minister.

"Sport in a totalitarian country is regarded solely and only as a government activity for the furtherance of government policy," he said. "The players who represent a totalitarian country in a sporting event are regarded as agents of their government and are expected to carry out in every respect their government's instruction."

Although the three Cincinnati men said they sold Charles' contract to Tannas exclusively, it was considered likely that Tannas will form a partnership with Pittsburgh promoter Jake Mintz.
