

Huskies Ask if Cage Pack Can Bite in '50

Seattle, Dec. 1 (AP)—They snarl, but do they bite?

It's a question everybody, including Coach Art McLarney, is asking about his University of Washington Huskies as the pack sneaks up on the basketball season.

It remains to be seen whether they'll be nifty in '50 or merely howling at the heels of Washington State, Oregon State, Idaho and Oregon in the northern division of the Pacific coast conference. That was their role last season, when they dropped to the cellar in the north after copping the conference flag in 1948.

Briefly, the men of McLarney will be tall but skinny, fast but inexperienced, scrappy but lightly muscled for a free-for-all.

This is the first team that is truly McLarney's own. In his first two seasons he inherited stars from the regime of Washington's great old man of basketball, Hec Edmundson. Gone are such brilliants as the mammoth adding machine, Jack Nichols; the thrill-maker with the 21-jewel movement, Sammy White, and the awkward genius of the backboards, Bill Vandenberg.

Three lettermen juniors and two sophomores have made up the varsity in early games. The three vets are Capt. Landon Henson, 6 feet 4, Russ Parhamer, 6 feet 3, and Louie Soriano, 5-10. Sophomore Center Duane Enoch stretches 6 feet 5. The other rookie, a budding replica of the unbelievable White, is Frank Guisness, 6-3.

"They're high, but they're narrow," worries McLarney, who holds the division record for worrying from a sitting or standing start. "They're the slat type, rather than the big beams which rule the game today. They'll have to outspeed, outthink and outscrap the enemy to win."

The enemy looms larger with each passing week. Art's Huskies have run a string of five victories against regional opposition. They hit the heavy going Dec. 20-21 in a home series with Minnesota, entertain Stanford Dec. 23 and battle Columbia in Seattle Dec. 30-31.

The rest of the slate is dedicated to winning the northern division flag, but a home session with Wyoming is sandwiched in for Feb. 10-11.

Backing up the first five in

this rough jaunt through the winter will be more of the same — more of the high, the young and the slender. Understudying Enochs at center, and pushing him for the job, are Don Stewart, 6 feet 4-inch junior, and a 6-6 sophomore, Lee Wade.

One senior may crack the starting five. He's Hal Arnason, who has been pushing Parhamer for the call at forward. Two deadeyes, Junior Jack Yard and Soph George Cahlich, are hot after front court assignments. Junior Keith Jefferson, fastest man on the squad but short and slightly built, and another senior, Marc Metzger, will keep Soriano and Henson at top performance in the guard spots.

That pressure for positions will guarantee 100 per cent effort and the fans can't be asking more.

McLarney isn't.

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
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
