

Love Did All Right In Headlines of '49

New York, Dec. 29 (AP)—It was love, love, love in 1949. Romance found fertile soil among the great, the rich and the famous—and blossomed magnificently in newspaper Wedding bells pealed constantly to a counterpoint of bobbysox screams, movie floodlights and photographers' flash bulbs.

Some of the world's most eligible bachelors joined the benedicts. Two world-famous film actresses suffered unhappily as the spotlights focused on their amorous adventures.

Notably, however, it was the year when the joys of mature romance took the lead over young love.

In rapid succession 71-year-old Vice President Barkley wooed and won a 38-year-old St. Louis widow, 77-year-old Herman B. Baruch took a wife, a blonde Dutch baroness, and 59-year-old Mayor William O'Dwyer of New York was married in Florida to a 33-year-old former model.

The 12-month cycle took off with pace-setting motion picture stars conducting international love affairs. Rita Hayworth met a Moslem prince, Aly Khan, son of one of the world's richest men and later married him.

Then black-haired and youthful-looking movie hero Tyrone Power, 35, married Actress Linda Christian, 25, in Rome.

People scarcely had time to draw a long breath before Florida's Governor Warren, 43, was married in Los Angeles to pretty Barbara Fuller, 23, a secretary. A month later Movie Producer David C. Selznick, 47, married Jennifer Jones, 30, an actress under contract to him, in Geona, Italy.

September brought the quiet wedding of a freshman politician from New York, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. The young man a short time earlier had been divorced from Ethel DuPont. He took Suzanne Perrin, a blonde New York society girl and former woman marine, as his second wife.

A short time later Rudy Vallee, 48, once a crooner and now a Hollywood actor, married his fourth wife Eleanor Kathleen Norris, 21. Skater Sonja Henie married New York blueblood Winthrop Gardner, Jr.—her second, his fourth.

The next month the seventh Earl of Harewood, nephew of the king of England, married a commoner, dark-haired Marion Stein, an Austrian-born pianist. Actress Sarah Churchill, 34, the wartime prime minister's second daughter, was married in Sea Island, Ga., to tall, dark and handsome Anthony Beachamp (pronounced Beecham), London society photographer who is a year her junior. It was her second marriage.

But it was the Veep, Alben Barkley, who was the nation's favorite romantic during the fall months.

With the energy of a young man, the widowed Kentuckian commuted between Washington and St. Louis and finally won the lady's hand. They were married with pomp and circumstance in November—with much of the goings-on televised.

Upon quitting the altar, the vice-president's bride (formerly Mrs. Carlton S. Hadley, Jr.) was heard to observe: "I hate to go out there and face that mess." "That's no mess, my dear," said the happy bridegroom. "That's the American people."

The great day for romance turned out to be Dec. 20.

On that one day, Mayor O'Dwyer, ailing but happy, married Miss Sloan Simpson as widely advertised. On the same day, long-widowed Clarke Gable caught everybody by surprise and married Lady Sylvia Stanley, widow of Douglas Fairbanks, Sr.

Less than a week later, on Christmas day, Gary Grant, another screen favorite, and Actress Betsy Drake, were married in a simple surprise cere-
