

Broken by Trio

Los Angeles, Dec. 29 (U.E)—All Pacific coast conference pass receiving records were broken during the 1949 football season by Ray Bauer of Montana, Dar-rell Robinson of Oregon and Bob Wilkinson of UCLA, league statistics showed today.

Bauer and Robinson e a c h grabbed 31 passes to top the old mark of 27 set in 1948 by Ore-gon's Dick Wilkins. Ken Rose of Stanford also bettered the mark with 28 catches.

Wilkinson broke the record for yardage from pass receiving by making 556 yards in 27 catches, compared to Wilkins' 520 yards in 1948 on the same number of receptions.

Wilkinson also scored 10 times on pass receptions to better any known conference mark. His 60 points placed him in a tie for second spot in the league scoring department.

Sophomore Bill Sheffold of Oregon State tled the conference record for pass interceptions His nine interceptions equalled the mark set by Bobby Robert-son of southern California in 1941 and Jack Leicht of Oregon in 1945,


