

Frozen Body of Texan Found

Crossville, Tenn. Dec. 29 U.5

The frozen body of a Texas flier who had hobbled through jungle terrain in a vain effort to summon help was found to-day about a mile and today about a mile and a half from his crashed plane on steep Devil Step mountain.

The flier, John Anderson, 35 Houston, Tex., was within a mile of a country road leading to a main highway when he apparently died of exposure and shock, aggravated by a broken leg, the night of the crash, December 22.

He had tried to fashion a splint for the broken light with

splint for the broken limb with his belt but apparently was un-able to salve his burns. He had written an unintelligible mes-sage on a rock and then, when that failed to bring aid, had crawled or hobbled down the mountainside only to die on the
