

City to Auction Off 28 Bicycles

Twenty-six bicycles and two bike frames will be sold by the City of Salem at public auction on January 14, the city attorney's office announced Friday.

The bicycles come under the description of unclaimed personal property, and according to a new city ordinance may be sold by auction.

The auction will be conducted at the municipal shops at 13th and Ferry streets, where the bicycles are now stored. The list of items which will be up for sale includes 24 boys' bicycles, 2 girls' bicycles and 2 bike frames and crank hangers. All sales will be for cash.

Jury Sees How Child Was Slain

Los Angeles, Jan. 6 (P)—Gruesome photographic evidence of how death came to six-year-old Linda Joyce Glucoft has been presented to a jury of 10 women and two men.

Fifteen photographs and four sketches of the child, showing wounds the prosecution claims were left by an axe, hammer, icepick and knife, were passed to the jurors yesterday.

The defendant charged with murder, 68-year-old Fred Stroble, averted his eyes and didn't look at the pictures. He has pleaded innocent and innocent by reason of insanity.

Linda's mutilated body was found November 14 discarded in the back yard of a house where Stroble was living.

Some of the jurors bit their lips and showed other signs of nervousness as they studied the pictures and listened to a detailed description of the wounds given by County Autopsy Surgeon Dr. Frederick Newbarr. He said the immediate cause of death was "asphyxia, due to strangulation," but added that "other conditions were multiple severe wounds."

Prosecutors announced that Stroble's statement given to the district attorney will be read to the jury. The statement related how Stroble attacked the child—a playmate of his own granddaughter—when she resisted his advances.

Men's Shop in Capitol Center

Ward Shryock, recent arrival in Salem from Chillicothe, Mo., with a high class men's apparel store, is the latest major mercantile addition to be announced for Capitol Shopping Center.

He expects to have the store opened and in operation between March 1 and 15. Mr. Shryock, wife and young daughter, have recently arrived here and are building a home on Candalaria heights.

For 18 years Mr. Shryock was in a similar business in Chillicothe. Seeking a new location, he made a wide search of the country and chose Salem.

For the Capitol Shopping Center location he has signed a 10-year lease with Pacific Mutual Life Insurance company through Grabenhorst Bros., realtors, as agents for the insurance company.

The location will be 20 by 125 feet between the Hughes Dress shop and the Kress store. It will extend from North Capitol street through to the parking area and will have entrances both on North Capitol and on the parking lot.

The building will be finished in Arizona sandstone, which will make it somewhat different from other buildings in the center. Fixtures will be ultra-modern, and the stock of men's wear of high type, and complete, with a line of shoes also.

Mr. Shryock has sold his business in Missouri. At present the Shryocks are living at the Ambassador apartments.

Chev Station Wagon Price Reduced \$250

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 6 (AP)—Chevrolet, first automobile in the low price field to offer an automatic shift on its 1950 models, announced today a cut in prices on one of its models.

Cost of the all-steel station wagon was slashed \$250, lowering the factory list price to \$1,880. Prices on all other models remained unchanged, the General Motors division said.

The 1950 Chevrolets will be shown to the public for the first time Saturday.

The new "powerglide" transmission will be available for \$150 on deluxe models as optional equipment. Chevrolet beat its competitors on the market with the automatic shift. Ford plans to bring out a no-shift device, "by summer," while Plymouth has remained quiet on the subject.

Ski Report Shows Snow at Timberline

Portland, Jan. 6 (P)—The ski report as compiled from the weather bureau and other sources: Timberline Lodge—129 inches of snow, trace of new snow; snowing lightly; roads clear, chains required; all tows operating over weekend. Forecast: Snow and fog with strong south wind today and tonight; Saturday snow flurries with southwest wind 15-20 miles per hour; warmer.

Lists 10 Most Valuable Trees

Lynn F. Cronmiller, assistant state forester, took the load of Hercules on his shoulders today in this timber producing region and named the 10 most important trees in the world.

Asked what 10 trees he considered the most important, Cronmiller selected this list, in the order of importance: Coconut palm, date palm, olive, apple, fig, almond, lemon, rubber, Douglas fir, pine.

Cronmiller selected his list on the basis of the trees' extensive use by a large number of people over the past thousand years. He noted, also, that the tree species should be one not readily replaced, and one of prime importance to the present generation.

Cronmiller struck the chin-chona tree, producer of quinine, from his list for the reason that atabrine now takes the place of this malaria curing drug. Also the mulberry tree, which feeds the silkworms, was eliminated through the production of nylon and rayon. The casaca or chittum tree, grown largely in Oregon, failed to place on the list because of its limited growing range.

Albert Wiesendanger, executive secretary for Keep Oregon Green, reviewed the selection. "The last two—Douglas-fir and pine—are the most important to the Keep Oregon organization. We are interested in keeping man-caused fires out of the fir and pine forests," he said. In 1949, Oregon had 1400 man-caused forest fires.

Burr Held on Larceny Charges

Robert M. Burr, the 22-year-old escapee from the Oregon state hospital, waived attorney and hearing rights Friday in district court and was ordered held for the Marion county grand jury on larceny charges.

Burr, who was returned from San Diego late Wednesday by Sheriff Denver Young and Captain Ray Howard of the state police, appeared in court Thursday morning and asked District Judge Joseph B. Felton for an attorney to represent him.

The larceny charge upon which he is being held by county authorities grew out of the theft of a car in Salem by himself and Marion Watson to flee southward to Mexico. The car was abandoned near the California border.

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U.S. National Leads Deposits

The United States National bank again leads the state in total deposits as revealed by its year-end statement just issued.

With deposits of \$527,181,823, the United States National bank has marked up a deposit increase of \$21,590,224 during the past six months. Total deposits for the Salem branches are \$45,089,870.00, according to D. W. Eyre, vice president, and loans totaling \$8,661,291.00.

The December 31 loans and discounts figure also indicates increased activity since the mid-year statement. Loans and discounts as of December 31 stand at \$148,218,809 compared with \$132,834,252 on June 30.

With 40 branches throughout Oregon, the United States National bank shows total resources of \$564,025,455.

During the past year, the United States National has continued its program of providing increased banking facilities throughout the state. Four new branches were opened in 1949, bringing to the communities of Amity, Monmouth, Sheridan and West Salem the resources and experience of Oregon's largest banking organization.

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Value Given To West Salem

The former city of West Salem, as a physical plant, was valued at \$289,746 at the time it was merged with the city of Salem last November.

The valuation figure appears in a report by Bowers, Davis & Huffman, employed by the city as auditors of its books. West Salem city records were used in making the audit, the accountants said, but in some cases these did not account for depreciation.

It was noted that in 1947 the West Salem city hall and its water system were mortgaged to the United States National Bank of Portland to secure a \$12,000 loan for water extensions. Still owed on the loan is \$9600. Repayment plan is \$1200 a year with 3 percent interest.

The report showed that in the water department there was a fund balance of \$133,137 and in other city departments \$221,955, including \$112,103 in fixed assets in the water department and \$177,643 in other property of the city.

Included in the latter total were city hall, \$30,376; street paving, \$101,756; sewer system, \$37,017; machinery and equipment, \$4465; office equipment, \$180; real estate and other buildings, \$3848.
