

Portland Road Parking Ban Asked of Council

Cooperation of the city of Salem is asked by the state highway department in prohibiting automobile parking on Portland road between Lana avenue and Hayesville school because of numerous accidents that occur on that stretch of Highway 99E.

The city's part of the program would be between Lana avenue and the north city limits and the highway department's from the limits on.

A resolution in the city council Monday night for the city's part of the program was tabled for two weeks.

City Manager J. L. Franzen said he had a letter from the highway department requesting it, and that it was related to plans of the highway commission to widen the highway.

Alderman O'Hara wanted to know what effect the banning of parking would have on businesses along the highway, and whether the manager had investigated that. Franzen replied that he had, and that most of the businesses have off-street parking.

CAA Report on Airports Here

Copies of the fourth annual report of the Federal Airport Act, prepared annually by the CAA for submission to Congress were received in Salem this week.

The report covering all phases of work accomplished under the Federal Airport program through the fiscal year ending June 30, 1949, was made public by the administrator of the civil aeronautics authority January 6. Listed are the total federal expenditures for airport construction and development, amounting to \$35,500,000 with \$20,404,923 of this for 345 completed projects.

Grant agreements where local sponsors have accepted grant offers for federal aid on specific projects numbered 765 for \$78,266,664 in federal funds for work on 630 airports. The \$78,266,664 represents approximately 76 percent of the \$103,774,079 in federal funds that have been allocated.

Listed in the report are all projects for airport development in the Federal Airport program, by states, showing those for which tentative allocations have been made, those under grant of or grant agreement, those that have been completed and the percentage of completion of those under construction.

Included in the report are projects at 26 airports in the state of Oregon, among them being Albany municipal airport, McMinnville municipal airport and Salem's McNary field.

President Quirino Enters Hospital

Baltimore, Jan. 10 (AP)—President Elpidio Quirino of the Philippines landed here today on his way to Johns Hopkins hospital for an operation.

More than 200 were on hand to meet him, including Gen. Carlos P. Romulo, his countryman who is president of the United Nations general assembly.

Governor William Preston Lane, Jr., of Maryland flew in from Annapolis 16 minutes earlier in a Maryland National Guard training plane to greet the visiting president.

Dr. Smith Talks On Cold War

Control of certain minerals and the ability to handle them is vital in the conduct of a war. And since the United States and those countries which are sympathetic with our ideals have a good share of those minerals, there is little prospect that Russia will start a war.

Dr. Warren D. Smith, member of the national board of the Atlantic Union committee and former head of the geological department of the University of Oregon, expressed these views during a talk before the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday noon. Dr. Smith will give an address concerning the Atlantic Union in Waller hall Tuesday night.

Chief of the minerals necessary to carry out a successful war were listed by Dr. Smith as oil, uranium, iron and aluminum. There are other essentials too, he said, 19 in all.

He spoke of the perfecting of a process for making oil out of coal and said this country had a supply of coal that would last 1000 years. Most essential, he stated, is an adequate supply of lubricating oil, something that Germany did not have in the last war.

While he said he did not like the idea, Dr. Smith believes communist China must be recognized upon the understanding that they stay out of Formosa.

In concluding, Dr. Smith asserted that "no government will long endure unless its pronouncements are based upon the philosophy of Jesus Christ."

Youth Confesses to Theft of Boy's Coat

A 14-year-old Salem youth, arrested on larceny charges by Salem juvenile authorities for the theft of another boy's coat, was held for juvenile court action Tuesday.

The youngster, who steadfastly denied any part of the theft, broke down and confessed only after parents of the boy whose coat had been stolen signed a formal complaint.

In his confession, the young prisoner said that his mother knew he had stolen the coat. Officers who were sent to investigate the case at the first report of the theft, related that the mother had indignantly slammed her door in their faces.

Check Drug Stores For Strychnine Sales

In an effort to determine who is poisoning dogs in the Keizer district, county dog control officer Erwin Ward Monday started a check of persons who have recently purchased strychnine from Salem drug stores.

Ward said that after checking a few strychnine registration books he abandoned the project because "so many of the signatures were obviously phoney."

Any person purchasing strychnine must sign a book stating his name, address, and the quantity of the poison bought. However, the merchant selling the strychnine seldom asks the buyer for identification, and as a result many fictitious names appear on the register, Ward explained.

57,000 Coal Miners Strike

Pittsburgh, Jan. 10 (AP)—Walkouts by soft coal miners today spread to three more steel companies which operate coal pits. About 57,000 diggers are idle in seven states in the unexplained walkouts.

At least 30,000 western Pennsylvania miners now are idle. About 7,200 stopped work at "captivity" or non-commercial mines, this morning. The number of idle Alabama miners rose from 5,000 to 6,000.

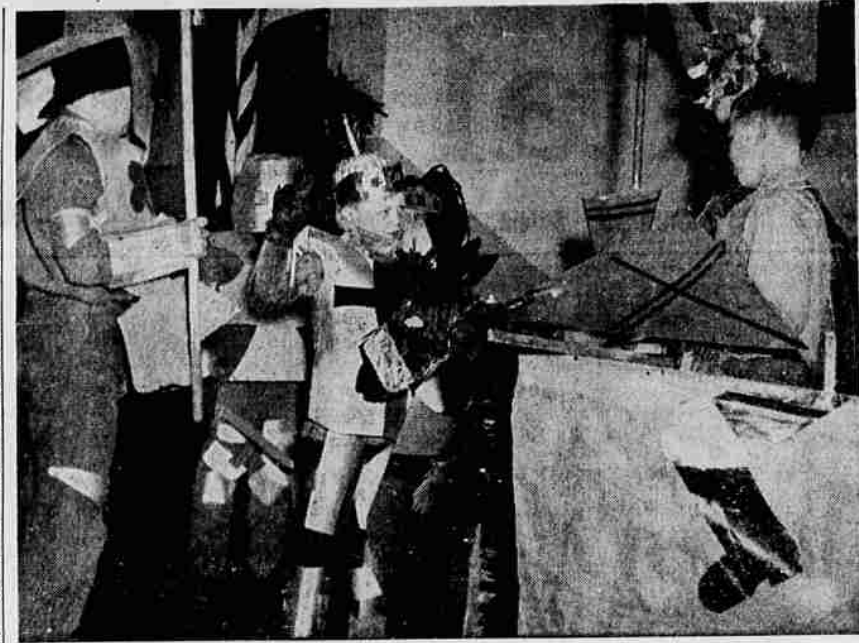
In Virginia, 2,300 striking miners returned to work. That left only 250 still out at one mine. About 70 men at one Kentucky mine resumed work, leaving 5,000 still out.

Miners failed to show up on the second day of the strike at some pits owned by the Jones and Laughlin Steel corporation, Wheeling Steel corporation and Bethlehem Steel corporation. Industry sources thing there's little chance of a general return to work before Monday. The nation's coal miners now are working only Mondays, Tuesday and Wednesday on orders of John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers.

Many of the idle miners don't even know why they are not working. The operators say the walkout is another effort to needle them into signing a new contract.

The strike began yesterday morning. UMW officials denied the action was ordered by union headquarters.

More Rains Fall on Flood Stricken Areas of Illinois

(By the Associated Press) More rain fell today over parts of the flood-stricken areas of Illinois and Indiana. Rescue crews worked to halt further breaks in levees along rampaging rivers and streams.

Strong winds prevailed throughout most of the flood region, creating a new hazard. Weather bureau officials said the high winds would make "heavy seas" of water in the lowlands. But temperatures were mild, bringing a measure of relief to the hundreds of persons who have been forced to flee from their homes.

Damage to crops and property mounted as waters spilled over thousands of acres of rich farm lands. The critical situation at Vincennes, Ind., appeared somewhat eased as the rain-swollen Wabash river receded slowly during the night. Army engineers, directing sandbagging operations on the weakened levees for two days, expressed the belief the worst of the flood was over.

Meanwhile, a cold wave, with winds up to 50 miles an hour, moved across Montana, the eastern Dakotas and Minnesota. The strong winds whipped snow into huge drifts in some areas of the cold belt. At Willmar, Minn., visibility was zero as 50-mile-an-hour winds whirled snow. The mercury hit zero and colder readings were forecast.

It was below zero in Montana and parts of the Dakotas as skies cleared.

Rain fell over areas from central Pennsylvania to the north Atlantic coast and there were thunderstorms from Arkansas to Kentucky.

New Courthouse Floor Plans Provide More Space

New floor plans for the proposed new Marion county courthouse were being informally circulated about the various county offices Tuesday, and the general consensus of opinion was highly favorable. The drawings were received Tuesday morning by Harlan Judd, county clerk and secretary of the courthouse commission, from Pietro Belluschi, Portland architect.

The new plan contains about 7400 more square feet of floor space than any previous plan submitted by Belluschi, who is working under contract to design the new courthouse building.

Every county office was pleased with the floor plan in general, and nearly every county official voiced approval of the layout of his own office in the plans.

Only minor changes, such as the moving of a partition or counter, were suggested by those who examined the new plans.

Among the greatest improvements over Belluschi's previous plans, county officials agreed Tuesday, was the vast amount of dead floor space in the basement.

With the county keeping permanent records of deeds, law suits, marriages, etc., much space is needed to store the old, bulky files.

Belluschi's earlier plans for the new courthouse did not allow enough room for the volume of files expected in the next 50 or 75 years. The new plans will accommodate all records for an unestimable amount of time, county officials who scrutinized the plans Tuesday said.

A formal hearing on the new plans will be held January 18 at 2 p.m. at the courthouse. At that Belluschi will meet with the courthouse commission, and will present a new exterior plan along with the new floor plans.

Loren Allen Has Top Art Honors

The showing will continue until January 24th, when the exhibit of Beatrice Appia of Paris gets underway.

UN Walkout Staged by Russ

Lake Success, Jan. 10 (AP)—The Russian delegation walked out of the United Nations security council today after a row over the Chinese question.

Deputy Foreign Minister Jakob A. Malik led his Soviet group from the chamber when the council rejected his demand for immediate action to expel the Chinese nationalist delegation.

By a vote of 8 to 2, the council upheld a ruling of Council President T. F. Tsiang, of nationalist China, to defer action on the Soviet proposal. Russia and Yugoslavia voted to overrule the president and India abstained.

The other delegates ignored the walkout.
