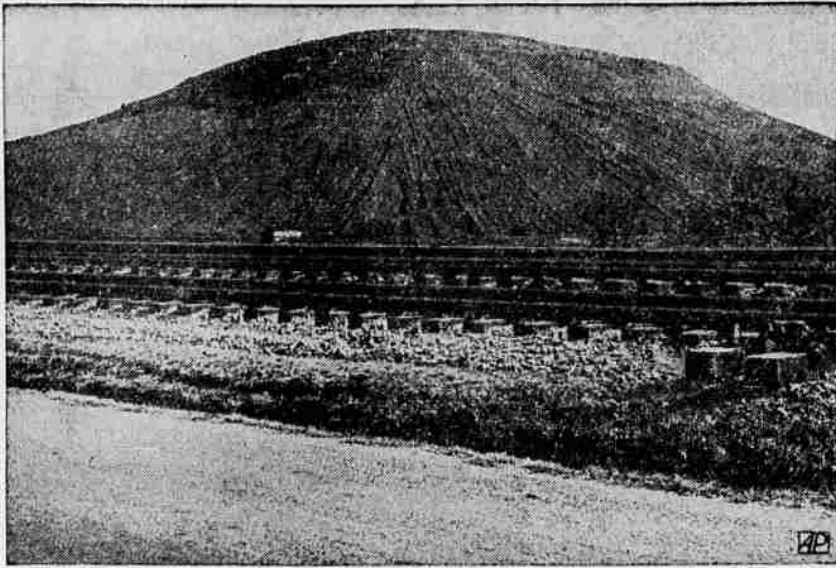

Leopardmen Strike Again In Terror Reign in Jungle

Lizala (Belgian Congo) Jan. 10 (AP)—A mangled body, with the heart cut out of it and claw marks of a leopard imprinted in the surrounding ground, means one thing to Belgian Congo police: The leopardmen have struck again.

This little known secret society operating in Central Africa claims dozens of such victims each year.

And work as hard as they will, the police cannot do much about it. The leopardmen seldom leave a witness to testify to their deeds.

The reasons for the killings is generally thought to be a ritual of nature, in which the human heart plays a part.

Victims are evidently chosen haphazardly as was the case of Kungbo Antoine, a young fisherman of the village of Yembongo near Libenge.

He and his friend Kizima Jean were walking along the road cutting the dense forest between Yumpli and Yembongo in November. It was pitch dark. A thunderstorm threatened. Lightning alone flashed from time to time to lighten their way.

Halfway between the villages, a man suddenly leapt from the undergrowth brandishing a huge bush knife and wearing a leopard skin. Kizima went down immediately from a knife blow. His friend went to his aid, and was attacked by a second man who leapt from the jungle.

Being unarmed, he fled, leaving his friend lying on the ground. He spent the night in the guard station of a nearby plantation, but did not say a word about the attack.

That is one more difficulty the police run up against in dealing with the leopardmen. Nobody will testify.

Next morning passers-by on the road discovered large blood stains and parts of human intestines. Following the macabre traces into the surrounding bush, they discovered the remains of Kizima. Only his torso remained.

Deeply imprinted on the body were the marks of claws. Human footprints and leopard pawmarks were visible around the body, and the heart was missing. Apart from a pair of trousers carefully folded under a tree nothing else was found.

The trousers clue was evidence that human beings had committed the murder. No animal, however crafty, can fold up a pair of trousers.

A judicial inquiry was immediately opened but without little hope of success.

The survivor either could not or would not identify the attackers. He was one of the few to have got away with his life in a leopardman attack.

He was not going to leave himself open to reprisals.

Norblad Attacks Truman Budget

Washington, Jan. 10 (AP)—Republicans in congress started sniping at President Truman's budget Monday as soon as it reached the capitol.

"I think the budget could be cut substantially by adopting recommendations of the Hoover commission," Rep. Walter Norblad, R., Ore., said. "The president has ignored this way out of our financial dilemma."

"The size of the deficit shows that the president's talk of economy and budget balancing in his State of the Union message was only for window dressing," said Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O.

"His long list of spending projects makes any balanced budget impossible."

Sen. Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., predicted that the single appropriation this year will enable congress to come much closer than it did last year to balancing the budget, despite the deficit forecast by Mr. Truman.

"We are going to cut this budget even though the president says it involves the prosperity of the nation," he said. "I don't think congress is going to agree that real prosperity is based on government expenditures, which this budget assumes."

House republican leader Joseph W. Martin, Jr., Mass.,

"The president's message as a security proposition cannot meet the simplest tests required by the SEC for private flotations. We are living in a propped-up economy."

"The American people are sick unto death of this juggling of public funds for political purposes. What they want is reduced expenditures, reduced taxes, and efficiency in government. The budget message clearly reveals that they are getting the exact opposite from this administration."

"The republicans in congress have no intention of accepting this budget and we will work night and day, if necessary, to bring it within the bounds of the capacity of the people to pay. Our aim will continue to be to provide jobs and security to

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U.S. Neglects Far East, Dulles Says

Seattle, Jan. 10 (AP)—Sen. John Foster Dulles (R., N.Y.), noted expert on foreign affairs, says this nation has "paid too much attention to the situation in Europe and not enough . . . in the far east."

Sen. Dulles, here to attend the council of churches session, reminded Americans that Stalin had said the most effective way to attack the west was through the east.

In an interview (with the Post-Intelligencer), the New York senator said the future of the bipartisan foreign policy was up to the administration.

"In a time when we are facing external peril as we are now, I think every American should respond to a general effort to create a united foreign policy."

"The administration has made no effort toward cooperation as far as a bipartisan foreign policy in the Far East is concerned," he said.

"I say we have paid too much attention to the situation in Europe and not enough attention to the situation in the far Pacific."

License Granted To R. L. Clark

The city council Monday night renewed the taxicab operator's license for Robert Lynn Clark, covering 12 vehicles.

At the same time it renewed the operator's license of Mrs. Eleanor Staab, who has three cabs.

The application of Don Clark, operator of the Capitol Cab company did not appear, and Mayor Elfstrom said he understood a sale of the company was pending.

Interest in the question of granting the license was aroused because of the taxicab scandal case of some weeks ago, involving 11 drivers.

Alderman Walter Musgrave was the only member to vote against granting a license to Robert Lynn Clark. He did not oppose Mrs. Staab's license.

Musgrave said his position relative to the Robert Lynn Clark license had been consistent, and he charged John Steelhammer, Clark's attorney, with inconsistency in remarks he had made at a public meeting held on the license question at the Chamber of Commerce. He also attacked Dave Hoss for remarks concerning him made over KSLM.

Clark in his application admitted having been charged with petty larceny in Seattle 20 years ago, but said his record has been clear since.

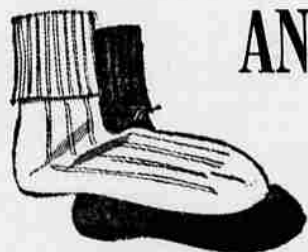
