

1st Symphony Concert Held

Salem gave a warm welcome to the Portland Symphony orchestra and its new conductor, James Sample, in the season's first concert here Tuesday night. The audience was not a capacity one, but certainly a responsive one, and those unable to attend missed a colorful presentation. Mr. Sample was called back to the stage repeatedly, and after presenting two encores at the conclusion of the program he waved to the crowd and reminded them the orchestra is returning in March.

The crowd enjoyed thoroughly the Concerto Grosso in D Minor of Vivaldi and Beethoven's Symphony No. 7, the first two numbers, but really warmed up for the group of three numbers following the intermission—Copland's Outdoor Overture, The Pleasure Dome of Kubla Khan by Griffes, and Enescu's Rumanian Rhapsody. With the first two numbers the audience quickly noted the full force of a well balanced orchestra and a smoothly functioning one. It was in the last group that the seeming knack of Mr. Sample and his musicians "to paint the pictures" of the themes was so marked.

For the encores the orchestra delighted the audience with the ever favorite, Blue Danube Waltz, and a sprightly little polka of Shostakovich.

It's a certainty the March 21 concert will see no empty seats. Salem liked the orchestra and its new conductor.

Allocation of Funds BBPA

Portland, Jan. 11 (AP)—Bonneville Power Administration today listed the transmission projects which would be built in the Pacific Northwest under the budget recommended by President Truman.

The \$69,000,000 budget includes \$25,000,000 for new construction and \$21,750,000 in contract authority.

Despite the new work, a power shortage will continue until 1953, when McNary dam generators start production, Bonneville officials said. Firm power can not be delivered to new heavy industry until 1954.

Bonneville listed the following allocations for 230 KV grid extensions:

Grand Coulee-Snohomish lines 1 and 2, \$1,865,000; Grand Coulee-Columbia lines 3 and 4, \$3,737,000; Grand Coulee-Midway line 3, \$4,057,000; Midway-Detroit-Koshon, \$12,180,000; Columbia-Olympia, \$3,075,000; Snohomish-Covington line and Covington substation additions, \$831,000; McNary-Big Eddy Troutdale, \$3,005,000; McNary-Maupin-Detroit-Albany, \$179,000; Ross-St. Johns line conversion, \$1,252,000; Grand Coulee-Spokane line 5, \$1,138,000.

Allocations for other transmission facilities include:

Portland area—Chehalis substation additions \$639,000; Longview substation additions \$183,000; J. D. Ross substation additions \$238,000; Salem-Boyer, \$197,000.

Southwest Oregon—Albany and Lebanon substations \$939,000; Mapleton-Reedsport \$902,000; Reedsport-Coos \$345,000; City of Springfield service \$315,000; McKinley-Gold Beach, \$1,558,000.

Captain E. L. Smith of the Salem department is president and Walter Kruse of Mt. Angel secretary of the association.

Salem Memorial To Receive Check

When the board of directors of Salem Memorial hospital meets Thursday night it will receive a check completing payment of \$100,000 from the Salem Hospital Development program. This was announced today by Ford Watkins, general chairman of the program.

The check to be received Thursday night will be for \$15,900. Of all funds collected above \$100,000 Salem Memorial hospital will receive 9 percent and Salem General hospital 91 percent.

Salem General hospital will have its annual meeting Wednesday night and will hear a progress report on construction of the new hospital.

Illness Fatal to Cedric Reaney

Cedric Tyler Reaney, manager of the Senator hotel since 1944, died Tuesday evening at a local hospital, where he had been a patient since suffering a heart attack December 28.

Reaney, who recently had been elected King Bing of the Salem Cherrians and has long been active in civic affairs here, was born at Lexington, Oregon, July 19, 1907, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Lee Reaney.

The Reaney family moved to Salem from Lexington and Reaney attended schools here, graduating from Salem high school. For about 10 years following his graduation he was employed by the Oregon Pulp & Paper company in Salem.

In 1936 Reaney took over management of the Jackson hotel in Medford and remained there until coming to Salem as manager of the Senator hotel in 1944. He at one time served as president of the Southern Oregon Hotel association and was a member of the Oregon Hotel association and the Hotel Greeters of America.

Reaney in his youth played amateur baseball and was a member of the Izank Walton league. He was a member of the Masons, Kiwanis and the BPOE lodge of Medford and a former member of the Salem 20-30 club. Surviving Reaney are his wife, the former Eleanor Chadwick, daughter of the W. W. Chadwicks, to whom he was married November 12, 1936; three sons, William Lee, Max Tyler and Ken Allen Reaney, all of Salem; his mother, Mrs. Myrtle Reaney of Salem; a sister, Mrs. Grace Bryan of Burbank, Calif.; a brother, Averil Reaney of Salem; and his grandmother, Mrs. Ella M. Tyler of Salem.

Funeral services will be held Friday, January 13, at 1:30 p.m. at the W. T. Rigdon chapel with Rev. Dudley Strain officiating. Interment will be in Belcrest Memorial park.

Henriksen Joins Training Center

Shore duty for Richard O. Henriksen, chief metal smith, U. S. navy, brought the chief to Salem Tuesday to join the staff of the Salem Naval and Marine Corps training center.

Chief Henriksen, a native of Wisconsin, began his naval career in April, 1938. He was aboard the cruiser, USS Astoria when it was sunk at Guadalcanal, after which he came back to the States and attended the naval dry dock school at Nibron, San Francisco.

His schooling completed, Henriksen was sent to Eureka, Calif., for duty where he helped put two floating dry docks into commission. With the second floating dry dock the chief went to Esperto Santo in the New Hebrides, where he remained until 1944.

Returning to the States in 1944, Henriksen helped put an oil tanker in commission and returned to the South Pacific seeing duty at Kwajalein and Eniwetok. Once again he returned to the States, helped put a floating dry dock into commission and returned to the Pacific with it, going to Eniwetok, where he was on duty at the end of the war.

After the war's end Henriksen was transferred to duty on the destroyer tender, USS Prairie, seeing duty on it for three years in China. June, 1949 he was transferred to the USS Saraha in Norfolk, Va., and remained on that ship until December 16, 1949, when he received his orders to duty at the Salem Naval and Marine Corps training center.

Coming to Salem with Chief Henriksen were his wife; his daughter, five years of age; and son, age two years. The family is making its home at Turner.

Riecks Against Zone Change

When the capitol zoning case goes to a public hearing before the city council Monday night, January 23, one of the main protesters will be Rieck Bros., Inc., formerly The Meadows, Inc.

The Riecks are owners of lots 3, 4 and 5 in block 89, in the fringe area to the proposed capitol zone. One of the lots faces Union avenue street and two face Capitol. They have owned one of the lots several years. One other was bought in October, 1947, and the third in April, 1948. Rieck Bros. paid \$26,400 for the lots plus accumulated taxes.

Later they were offered considerable more for the lots than was paid for them, but did not want to sell because construction of a restaurant building was planned.

Herman Rieck said today he had expected to start construction in February of a combination drive-in and inside restaurant with off-street parking for 85 cars.

But the ordinance now before the city council would change the zone classification of two of the lots from Class III business to Class I residential, which would ban all construction but residences. The bill does not mention lot 3, block 89, which evidently would be left in zone III.

Initiative Bill Bars Liquor Ads

Initiative petition to make it unlawful to promote sale of liquor by advertising was filed with the state department today. If 25,482 signatures are obtained by July 6, it will be on the November election ballot.

Sponsors of the measure are Mrs. Ruth Toozee, Portland, president of the Oregon Women's Christian Temperance union; Roy M. Lockenour, Salem, chairman of the Oregon Council of Churches; Gervais Carey, Dundee; Harry L. Dillin, McMinnville; and Morgan S. Odell, Edward Clark and E. R. Abbotte, all of Portland.

An attempt to get a similar measure on the 1948 general election ballot failed for lack of enough signatures.

Under the measure, a liquor advertisement could contain only the name of the producer or dispenser, name of the product, the price, and where it is sold. It would apply to all alcoholic beverages. Radio advertising would be unlawful, and it would be illegal to solicit orders through newspapers or periodicals.

Mayor to Present First Citizen Award

Mayor Robert L. Elstrom is scheduled to award Coburn Grabenhorst the 1950 Junior First Citizen award at a banquet to be held next Tuesday night under the sponsorship of the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The award is to be made as one of the highlights of the annual Jaycee banquet. The selection of Grabenhorst as the recipient of this year's award was announced last Saturday. His name was selected by a special committee of Salem businessmen and women from candidates whose names were submitted by the public.

The annual first citizen awards sponsored by the service group have been made for more than a decade in Salem. Each year, a person between the ages of 21 and 35, whose work in the community has been outstanding, is honored at the banquet. The full program for the banquet has not been announced as yet.

British Minister Sees U. S. Moving Toward Socialism

Observations of Dr. Herbert Lockyer, a Britisher by birth, currently engaged in a series of meetings at the First Baptist church, convince him that the United States is rapidly moving toward socialism.

"The welfare state, and socialization of medicine are straw men in the wind which indicate a definite trend," stated Dr. Lockyer during an interview Wednesday.

Dr. Lockyer, formerly of Liverpool, England, regarded on both sides of the Atlantic as an outstanding preacher and Bible teacher, bases his predictions not only on what he has seen and experienced in England but what he has observed during his travels in this country.

The minister feels that the Labor party will be retained in power in England but with considerably diminished majority. "One cannot expect the working people who have benefitted so much through the Labor party's program to bite the hand that feeds them," commented Dr. Lockyer.

"Socialized medicine is not good," volunteered the Britisher, although he acknowledged many persons had been provided with eye glasses and teeth who needed them.

As for the church, the minister said the war dealt it a serious blow not only from the standpoint of the physical plant but spiritually as well. Five thousand churches were destroyed by bombings of the Germans. Too, with all able bodied persons working seven days a week and with the children widely dispersed there was little opportunity for religious services.

Attendance was "lamentable," a vital factor in Britain becoming "very, very pagan," said Dr. Lockyer. He added that the Labor party schedules many of its meetings on Sunday, something that the conservatives always avoided.

Potato Quotas Set for Farmers

Portland, Jan. 11 (AP)—Oregon counties commercial potato acreage allotments were reported today and instructions for assigning the 29,600 acres to farms were mailed to county committees.

The state allotment is down from last year's 32,400 acres. The report was made by E. Harvey, Miller, state production and marketing administration director.

The county allotments: Baker 580; Clackamas 180; Crook 3500; Deschutes 3550; Hood River 20; Jefferson 1940; Klamath 10,290; Lake 200; Malheur 6757; Marion 261; Morrow 120; Multnomah 1358; Umatilla 250; Washington 144 and Yamhill 250.

Held in reserve were some 200 acres to take care of commercial growers in counties not listed above and to make any adjustments made necessary by appeals.

Washington, Jan. 11 (AP)—President Truman today nominated Henry L. Hess to be U. S. district attorney for Oregon. Hess now is serving under an appointment which expired Nov. 29.

Civil Service for Census Asked

Young Democratic clubs of Oregon want the selection of persons engaged in taking the federal census taken away from political parties and given to the civil service commission.

Also they favor the payment of national committeemen of all recognized political parties when they are elected by direct popular vote.

Resolutions expressing a stand on these two subjects were adopted at a meeting of the executive board of the Young Democratic Clubs of Oregon held in Eugene last Sunday.

Chairmen and vice chairmen of committees for the forthcoming state convention were appointed. They included: Rules, William Gonong, Klamath county; and William Linkletter, Coos county; credentials, David Cromwell, Marion county; and Mrs. Marion Foster, Clackamas county; constitution, Dale Gibson, Deschutes county; and Alan Carson, Jr., Marion county; resolutions, Jack Sallis, Lane county; and Ed Ridderbusch, Benton county.

Plans for the state convention, which is to be held in the latter part of March, were discussed.

\$3850.99 Cost of Neef Ave. Program

County Surveyor A. D. Graham has estimated \$3850.99 as the cost of reconstructing Neef avenue in the Neef subdivision south of Salem. This would call for an assessment of \$1.76 per ownership foot, he said.

Since Neef is not a county road, the financing of its reconstruction would have to be made through the assessment of persons who own land adjoining the avenue, Graham explained.

A public hearing on the proposed road improvement has been scheduled for January 23 at 10:30 a.m. in the Marion county courthouse. If no strenuous objections to the project are raised at that time, the project will then be open for bids. Graham's estimate is for a complete new road, including grading, base, and oil surfacing.

Coos Bay-Roseburg highway, Coos county line to North Fork of Coquille river.
