

March of Dimes Drive to Open

The big push for the annual March of Dimes campaign, slated for Saturday, will feature a formation of six planes from the local U. S. naval facility, the display of an iron lung and a rally that is expected to attract thousands of persons to the courthouse area where the ceremonies will be completed.

The planes are scheduled to fly over the city just as the final strains of the national anthem are being played. The iron lung will be placed on exhibition at the March of Dimes booth erected on the High Street side of the courthouse block.

If weather conditions are unfavorable, the program will be transferred to the armory.

The list of speakers include Governor Douglas McKay; Dr. E. T. Hedlund, state chairman for the March of Dimes; Judge Grant Murphy, honorary county chairman; Mayor R. L. Elstrom, honorary city chairman; Frank B. Bennett, superintendent of schools; Mrs. Agnes Booth, county school superintendent; Elmer Church, last year's county chairman. Bands from Salem, Jefferson, Stayton, Woodburn, and Willamette university are expected to participate as will the Salem Indian drum and bugle corps.

Demos Praise GOP Oregonian

Portland, Ore., Jan. 12 (AP)—Oregon's democratic party has commended the republican Portland Oregonian, saying the paper printed articles unfavorable to its largest advertiser, and suffered loss of advertising as a result.

National Committeeman Monroe Sweetland said advertising in a magazine cancellation followed publication of two stories by the Oregonian on a national labor relation's board ruling that Meier & Frank, Inc., of Portland, one of the nation's largest department stores, had violated fair labor practices. The ruling held the store had tried to prevent employees from unionizing.

The Multnomah county democratic central committee last night passed a formal resolution commending the paper "for its courageous endeavor to present the truth and protect the institution of the free press."

Portland's other daily newspaper, the Oregon Journal, published first news of the December 31 NLRB ruling on its first page. Because the story "broke" too late, it missed part of one edition. Subsequent editions carried stories on the ruling. Its advertising apparently was not reduced.

Neither the Oregonian nor the Meier & Frank managements would comment for publication.

Williams on Board of Trustees for Engineers

W. C. Williams, assistant state highway engineer in Salem, was elected to the board of trustees of the Professional Engineers of Oregon for 1950, it was announced in Portland.

Mr. Williams will be installed at the annual meeting of the engineering organization in Portland on January 28. Other newly-elected officers include J. A. Corenbaum, president; Hilbert Johnson, vice president; and R. B. Temple and E. J. Himes, board of trustees.

Elmer Balton Held At Chehalis, Wn.

Marion county authorities were advised Thursday that Elmer Balton, Jr., sought on a warrant charging him with car theft, had been apprehended by authorities in Chehalis, Wash.

Information which led to Balton's arrest was provided by the sheriff's office. He was accused of stealing a car from Ramey J. Lambert of St. Paul. Balton was found in Lambert's car when arrested.

Sheriff Denver Young said he would leave Friday for Chehalis to take Balton into custody. Balton waived extradition.

Ingrid Bergman to Give Up Child for Love

Rome, Jan. 12 (AP)—Ingrid Bergman has made arrangements to get a Mexican divorce so she can marry Roberto Rossellini, Italian movie director, "as soon as possible," the director's lawyer announced today.

The attorney said Miss Bergman and her husband, Dr. Peter Lindstrom, Hollywood surgeon, had reached a divorce agreement which will give him custody of their daughter, Pia, 11. They also agreed on a property settlement, he added.

Lewis' Mother Dies Springfield, Ill., Jan. 12 (AP)—Mrs. Anna Louisa Watkins Lewis, mother of Labor Leader John L. Lewis, died at her home today after a long illness.

Plane Hearing Set February 20

Still a later date for the hearing of the civil aeronautics board's show-cause hearing on discontinuance of United Air Lines' service in Salem has been set.

Word was received here Thursday morning that the date of the hearing which is to determine whether a feeder-line service, that of West Coast Airlines, shall be substituted for United, a trunk line, has now been set for February 20. Previously, the date had been announced for February 16.

All exhibits for the hearing from all parties concerned are to be submitted to the CAB not later than January 16, January 30 has been set as the date for all rebuttals on the exhibits to be submitted.

2 Female Dogs Kill 14 Turkeys

Two female dogs got into a turkey hatchery owned by Felix Wright of route 3, box 104, Wednesday night and killed 13 laying turkey hens and one tom. Several other birds were injured.

The dogs were owned by Harold R. Lance, a neighbor of Wright, who will be held responsible for about \$140 damages, county dog enforcement officer Irvin Ward said Thursday.

Ward said he observed several dogs running loose in that area, near Silverton. Many of the dogs were without licenses, and some had strayed as far as two miles from their homes.

With the turkey and sheep killing problem growing, Ward urges all dog owners to keep their dogs under immediate supervision when not chained, unless the dog owner knows the dog well enough to be certain that the dog will not molest fowl or livestock.

Zontas Listen To Tax Talk

Fundamentals of taxation were discussed for the Zonta club program Thursday noon at the Golden Pheasant by Arthur Selander, chief appraisal engineer, state tax commission. He quoted the United States constitution and the Oregon constitution to show by what authority tax levying bodies operate, pointing out that whatever the tax it has to be uniform on the class of property on which it is assessed.

Mr. Selander discussed the three major general systems of taxation in Oregon—the ad valorem or general property tax, the income tax, and the excise or privilege tax.

Taxes are set up by the "voice of the people," and Mr. Selander pointed out how lax voters can be sometimes. He quoted a case of one municipality proposing a tax increase to 117 per cent and approved by a vote of 25 to 4, and said there was much complaint later, yet too few people turned out to vote when they should have expressed their opinion on the matter. He explained the 6 per cent limitation act in the Oregon laws.

Preceding Mr. Selander's talk, Dr. Helen Pearce, a past Zonta International president, briefly told of Zonta International's Amelia Earhart day, January 11, and explained the scholarship given each year through Zonta to a woman interested in aeronautical engineering, known as the Amelia Earhart scholarship. The noted woman flier was a member of Zonta, and the day designated in her honor marks the anniversary of her first solo flight to Honolulu.

Thomas Defends Brannon Plan

Lyle Thomas, who may compete with Rep. Walter Norblad for the republican congressional nomination, defended the Brannon farm program in an address to the Salem Lions club Thursday noon.

He contrasted the Brannon plan with the present farm program by citing the Brannon plan declaration that all commodities are basic, while the present program names six commodities—corn, cotton, wheat, rice, tobacco and peanuts—as basic.

"These six commodities add up to votes," he said, "and economy is not considered."

"I don't think," he added, "that it would be possible for anyone to suggest a worse agricultural program than the one we have now, when 2 percent of the farmers are getting 25 percent of the farm income."

Speaking of agriculture and industry he said "the general welfare of the country depends on closing the gap between in a two-way economy between agriculture and industry."

The National Association of Manufacturers, Thomas said, employed a board of economists to investigate the Brannon plan, and their report was so favorable it was withdrawn from circulation.

"We are not expanding opportunity in America," he said, "but are permitting it to be restricted."

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Last Rites for Mrs. Gabbart

Funeral services are to be held at the W. T. Rigdon chapel Friday morning at 10 o'clock for Mrs. Estella A. Gabbart, daughter of early Oregon pioneers, who died at a local hospital Tuesday. Rev. Dudley Strain is to officiate at the ceremony and interment will follow at the Pleasant Hill cemetery, near Eugene.

The daughter of Lowry B. Rowland and Elizabeth McCall Rowland, who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1852, Mrs. Gabbart was born at Pleasant Hill, Oregon, October 9, 1860.

From Pleasant Hill the Rowland family moved to Monmouth, and there Mrs. Gabbart attended the Christian college, graduating with the last graduating class of the college in 1882.

A teacher in the schools of Oregon for 25 years, she was living in Portland at the time that she was married to Keeler H. Gabbart, newspaperman in Oregon City. The Gabbarts resided in Oregon City until his death and then Mrs. Gabbart returned to Portland. From Portland she came to Salem to make her home with her brother Theodore Gabbart, who for years was a draftsman with the state highway department.

Mrs. Gabbart was an active worker in the Christian church. Surviving are the brother, Theodore Gabbart of Salem; several cousins, including Mrs. May Kuykendall and Otto Rowland of Eugene, Mrs. Arthur Turner and Jack Palmer of Portland and Mrs. Ralph Cooley of Salem; and several nieces and nephews including Reed Rowland of Portland and Edgar Rowland in California.

Cattle Owners Can Save Calves

Cattle owners can go a long way toward preventing heavy calf losses this winter by following approved feeding and sanitation practices to avoid calf scour in their herds, the American Foundation for Animal Health advises.

A Foundation bulletin gave these pointers on controlling scour, which is rated as one of the nation's No. 1 calf-killers: "Remember that there are two types of scour. One kind is due to digestive upsets, while the other is contagious, and may sweep swiftly through a herd."

"The non-infectious type usually is brought on by overfeeding, feeding from dirty utensils, irregular feeding, sudden change of feed, or chilling. In some cases, it is caused by the milk itself."

"At the first sign of trouble, owners should obtain a veterinary diagnosis to determine which type of scour is present. As a safety measure, the scouring calves' rations should be cut in half until a course of treatment is worked out."

"Infectious, or white scour, is much more dangerous than the type caused by digestive upsets. The healthy calves should be immediately isolated from the sick ones. Quarters which have housed sick animals should be scrubbed out with a lye solution, and the litter should be burned."

200 Sites for Airforce School

Washington, Jan. 12 (AP)—Nearly 200 sites in 34 states have been recommended for the proposed air force academy.

The list, made public by the air force yesterday, includes 13 locations in Oregon and one each in Idaho and Washington.

No mention was made, however, of the former Farragut, Idaho, naval training station which is being backed as a possible choice by the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and Idaho officials.

Recommended sites include: Oregon—Baker, Bend, Burns, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Lakeview, Madras, Ontario, Pendleton, Portland, Prineville, Redmond, The Dalles.

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County Denies Garbage Charge

Marion county court Thursday denied statements made by residents of the Macleay area that the county is improperly managing the Macleay garbage dump.

A petition signed by those living in the vicinity of the 45-acre dump was submitted to the court. The petition complained that the dump was becoming a nuisance to the people of that area.

Norman K. Winslow, Salem attorney who drew up the petition, alleges that the dump is situated in a thickly-populated area, and is creating an unpleasant odor.

Property owners claim that their land is decreasing in value as a result of the dump being located there. The petition further states that the garbage disposal plot is not being supervised properly, in defiance of state board of health regulations.

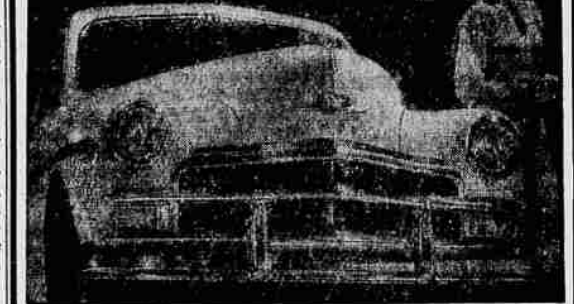
"With very modest regulations, we deny every one of the allegations," County Judge Grant Murphy said after hearing the petition.

The petition merely asked for a hearing on the matter, and the court granted that. The hearing was set for February 15 at 10:30 a.m. in the courthouse.
