## **Norblad Urges Budworm Funds**

Washington, Feb. 11 (P)-Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) urged a house appropriations subcommittee to-day to approve spending \$1.200,-000 to fight the spruce budworm

in Washington and Oregon.
Norblad said that insects have destroyed more timber in the last 40 years than has been de-stroyed by fire. He said private citizens and

the two states are cooperating in the program and will shoul-der part of the cost to fight the insect on 2,000,000 acres of land. Damage already done by the spruce budworm has amounted to nearly \$50,000,000, he said.

Urging quick approval of the proposed program, he said the spraying must be done in May and June to be effective.


