U. S. and Canada In Wheat Pact Ottawa, March 4 (P)-Canada and the United States have found a solution to a three-month con-

troversy over wheat, it was an-nounced today. A joint statement by U.S. Agriculture Secretary Charles Bran-nan and Trade Minister C. D Howe of Canada said the nature of the agreement—which was not disclosed—will be presented as a recommendation to the international wheat council.

The council meets in London March 13. It will decide whether West Germany and Japan will be admitted as importing members under the multilateral

wheat pact. The entry of the two countries will mean an additional market under the pact of 100,000,000 bushels of wheat a year. The United States, which

wanted to obtain the full extra market for itself, will allow part of the market—about 25,000,000 bushels annually—to be sup-plied by Canada. The division will not take place until the


