

Making of Little Horses As Hobby Becomes Business

It started as a hobby 15 years ago but has grown into almost a business—the making of little horses by Fanny Branson, who has loaned a few of the little animals to the First National Bank to place on exhibit.

The horses made by Mrs. Branson are to remain on exhibit for two weeks and then will be replaced by model historical stage coaches, prairie schooners and other vehicles that have made transportation history. These also belong to Mrs. Branson, who has received them in exchange for some of her horses.

Born at Vale, Oregon, Mrs. Branson as a child lived on a large stock ranch and with her sister rode herd on the stock. It was during that time that she learned to whittle, she and her sister whittling away their time carving the range animals from the chalk of eastern Oregon.

A fall from her horse made Mrs. Branson a semi-invalid and to keep from feeling sorry for herself she started making miniature horses. Her collection has grown to such an extent that she and her husband have them in a museum at Agate Beach and estimate that they have from 600 to 800 horses in the collection.

Her husband now works with her on the hobby and their home is a combination living quarters, tannery, carpenter shop, work shop and museum.

The little animals are carved from balsa and their legs from the more sturdy ash. The muscles are modeled from paper mache and the hides on the animals are carefully selected by the Bransons from slaughter houses and then tanned by the Bransons.

Many of the horses are complete with saddles and bridles which are hand tooled. Those on exhibit include a side saddle, the type of saddle used on the range and the more decorative type with silver and jeweled trim.

Twin Slayer Sent Asylum

Fresno, Calif., April 1 (AP)—Fourteen-year-old Alice Richard today was committed to a state mental institution for further observation in the March 19 "hate slaying" of her twin sister, Sally.

Juvenile court Judge Arthur Shepard declined to name the institution or to identify the form of mental illness attributed to the girl.

Judge Shepard stressed, however, the case was not a criminal one.

"It's merely a case of prescribing treatment for a sick child," he said.

Commitment of the surviving twin followed just 12 days after Sally met her death by shooting.

The jurist indicated Alice would be observed for 90 days, then returned for court action.

He added that several such periods of observation and confinement could possibly follow.

The jurist said he had received hundreds of letters from anxious parents, interested psychiatrists and "crackpots."

To quiet the fears of worried parents, the judge said:

"We are satisfied that the fact of being a twin sister was neither a primary nor a contributory cause of the killing. Parents should drop this phase of the matter from their minds."

"What happened here was that a mentally sick girl killed another girl with whom she was closely associated. The sisterhood was purely incidental."

110 Precincts in Marion County

Marion county voters will go to the polls in 110 precincts for the May 19 primary elections.

This is an increase of 18 precincts over the number for the last election. In addition to upping the number of precincts, the county clerk's office has also numbered all precincts in the county.

Heretofore, many rural precincts had been known by name only, such as "East Silverton" and "Hazel Green." Now the names have been dropped, and all precincts are known by a number.

Numbers 1 to 42 are for precincts within the city limits of Salem. From 42 up, the numbers do not run consecutively.

Within a five-mile radius of Salem, every third number is used. Outside the five-mile radius, every other number is used.

Reason for staggering the precinct numbers, explains County Clerk Harlan Judd, is to simplify the numbering of precincts when population increases in certain areas calls for the splitting of precincts.
