

LEADING RESEARCHER SAYS:

Body's Reaction to Germs Often Kills Patient Instead of Germs

Chicago, April 8 (P)—Dr. Hans Selye, one of North America's leading researchers, yesterday described a new concept of medical science—that the body's defense reaction against germs often kills the patient instead of the germs.

Dr. Selye, a leading investigator of the mysteries of adrenal gland function, spent 14 years studying how the body's "alarm" mechanism reacts to infection, cold, heat, chemicals, fatigue, worry, burns, injury, intoxications, starvation and other forces.

Easter Bunny Brings a Baby

Pittsburgh, April 8 (P)—Nine-year-old Dickie Higgins burst into his father's bedroom this morning shouting:

At Children's hospital, Dr. Edward Klee said Higgins' prompt action probably saved the child's life. The infant was apparently born about 6 a.m. today, the doctor said, and had been out in the cold ever since.

Does Higgins plan to adopt the youngster?

"Gosh, I don't know," the bricklayer said at his home in suburban Carnegie. "I guess I'd have to talk that over with my wife first. She's in Detroit with our other two kids, Kathy, 4, and Joe, Junior—he's 2—visiting her father, George Corey, for the holidays.

"Say, that's something, isn't it? My wife's in Detroit and here I have a baby in Pittsburgh?"

Binaggio Asked Truman Truce

St. Louis, April 28 (P)—The St. Louis Star-Times reported today Charles Binaggio, slain Kansas City political leader, tried desperately in the last few weeks of his life to make political peace with President Truman.

The newspaper said in a copyrighted article it learned details of a plan to remove frictions between the rival democratic organizations of Binaggio and James Pendergast.

The Star-Times said the plan called for:

The voluntary retirement of Binaggio from politics.

An attempt to force the withdrawal from the race for the democratic nomination for U. S. senator from Missouri of State Sen. Emory W. Allison of Rolla, Mo., and Thomas C. Hennings, Jr., of St. Louis.

Introduction of a compromise candidate.

President Truman is a member of the Jackson Democratic club, the faction headed by Pendergast. He has publicly endorsed Allison for the senatorial nomination.

The Star-Times said the plan fell apart because Mr. Truman refused to budge on Allison's

He said he found they all had one thing in common—these forces made the adrenal glands above the kidneys pour chemicals into the blood stream.

In his research, Dr. Selye theorized that stress causes drastic physical changes in the body by acting on the adrenal glands and nervous system.

Dr. Selye, who is director of the Institute of Experimental Medicine and Surgery at the University of Montreal, said in interview the cause of many diseases are not known. These include rheumatoid arthritis, high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries.

Under his concept, he said the patient could be helped by making his body adapt itself to these stresses. Medical science now is based on the general concept that before a patient can be cured the cause of the disease must be eliminated.

He cited as one example of how a body's natural defense can be made to adapt itself to stress—the relief of rheumatoid arthritis and rheumatic fever with the adrenal hormone cortisone.

Dr. Selye was to describe his concept today before the Chicago Heart association and the Chicago Medical society. He said since the recent discovery of the new hormones—ACTH and cortisone—he has been invited to discuss his ideas before many medical groups in the United States and Europe.

Firecrackers Outside City

Sale of firecrackers has been outlawed within the Salem city limits this year, but that regulation won't prohibit the sale of fireworks in the "fringe" area around the city.

The Marion county court made that clear Saturday, as it issued the first two permits to sell fireworks in Marion county. Both permits were issued to Kelzer Boy Scout troop No. 41, which will operate two fireworks stands.

Judge Grant Murphy explained that Oregon state laws make no provisions for counties to regulate the sale of fireworks. Counties may issue permits for fireworks stands, if they so desire, but they may not rule the sale of fireworks illegal.

Murphy said the county court would probably be inclined to go along with the city of Salem in banning the sale of fireworks if the state laws allowed him to do so.

The newspaper reported Binaggio agreed to a new political setup in Kansas City to be headed by five men.

Finance Bills Before Council

Before the city council for final action Monday night will be the financial measures which the council proposes to put on the ballot at the May 19 special election.

The measures total about \$1,425,000 in bond issues and also a millage tax bill of 2.6 mills for benefit of the airport.

The proposed bond bills are \$800,000 for sewers and sewage disposal, \$125,000 for bridges, \$200,000 for drainage, and \$300,000 for water system. The water system bonds would not require outside financing.

The bills, if they go on the ballot, will be separate so voters may express themselves on each separately.

Another bill to be voted on Monday night calls for the special election on May 19.

On the agenda for third reading is a measure that would require that off-street parking for apartment houses be practically for 100 per cent of the occupancy, and would also make off-street parking requirements for hotels and rooming houses.

The daylight saving bill will be up for final action, and also a bill requiring that the processing plants of milk concerns distributing in Salem must be within the city limits.

Four Ballots by Bridges Jury

San Francisco, April 8 (P)—It took four ballots to convict Harry Bridges of lying to conceal communist party membership, a jury member disclosed today.

The juror, who asked that his identity be withheld, said the first ballot showed six for conviction, two for acquittal and four blanks. The second one was 8-2-2, the third 11 for conviction and one for acquittal. The fourth was unanimous.

The first ballot was taken Sunday. Shortly before noon Tuesday came the verdict convicting Bridges, president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union, of perjury and conspiracy.

The one holdout after the third ballot took a lot of convincing, the juror said. Several hours passed between ballots, both taken Monday.

The jury then turned to Henry Schmidt, finally to J. R. Robertson, fellow officials in the longshore union. They were found guilty of conspiracy and of aiding their chief to obtain U. S. citizenship through false statements.

The juror said four ballots also were required to convict Schmidt, beginning with one that tallied eight for conviction, two blanks and two for acquittal. The first ballot on Robertson was 10-1-1. Decisions on both men came Tuesday morning.

Quadruplet Girls Born in Alabama

Louisville, Ala., April 8 (P)—Quadruplet girls were born to the 33-year-old wife of a Barbour county tenant farmer near here early today.

The mother, Mrs. Mackie O'Neal Singleton, and four babies were reported in good condition at Salter's hospital, Eugene, Ala., where they were taken.

The delivery was made at their farm home about 10 miles north of Louisville, by a country doctor, R. O. Norton.

First of the infants was delivered about 5 a.m., he said. The others came periodically over a three-hour period.

Dr. Paul P. Salter said the smallest of the infants weighed two pounds and ten ounces, the heaviest two pounds, 14½ ounces.

The parents have six other children, including a set of four-year old twins.

2 Quakes Reported In Soviet Territory

Moscow, April 8 (P)—Two strong earthquakes were reported today by the Soviet press to have been registered during the past four days in or near Russian territory.

Soviet seismological stations reported one of the quakes was centered in the Mongolian republic (Outer Mongolia) near Lake Kosogol, 2,550 miles east of Moscow.

The other quake, said the report, was centered in the south Asian province of Ashkhabad, in the Soviet Turkmenistan republic bordering on Iran.

The press reports said scientific workers had been sent to the scene of the quakes.
