**Binaggio Killing Order Reported**

St. Louis, April 13 (AP)—The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said today that the assassination of Charles Binaggio, Kansas City democratic leader, was ordered two weeks ago during a conference of gangsters and gamblers at the Hyde Park Gambling Club in Venice, Ill.

In a copyrighted story by Crime Reporter Theodore C. Link, the newspaper said Binaggio was one of three politicians whose "elimination" was discussed at the conference.

The story said the first man on the gangsters' list was "a major political figure," the second was Binaggio and the third was a minor politician who had a voice in Gov. Forrest Smith's appointments to the St. Louis board of police commissioners.

Plans to kill the first victim were dropped because he was "too big," the story said. Binaggio's name was the only one left after they decided the minor politician had not handled any money for the governor's 1948 campaign.

**Korean Reds Wiped Out**  
Seoul, April 13 (AP)—The defense ministry said today 304 communist-trained guerrillas from North Korea have been wiped out.

Equipment already was moving out of the city before the strike started.

Powerful police forces protected stevedores who worked throughout the night to load the 319 tons of artillery, small arms, ammunition and military stores into 35 freight cars.

The arms arrived on the American freighter Exilona shortly before dark last night under a blanket of secrecy imposed by the Pro-Western government of Premier Alcide de Gasperi.

**U. S. Arms Unloading Too Early for Reds**  
Naples, Italy, April 13 (AP)—The first American arms shipment to Italy was unloaded before dawn Wednesday and started on its way to army depots before the communists could make good on their threat to stop it.

**WANTS TO WED FOR LOVE**

**Beauty Asks to Stay in U. S. To Avoid Planned Marriage**

Tulsa, Okla., April 13 (AP)—A Bolivian beauty who fears marriage to a man "I can never love" begged immigration officers for permission to stay in the United States.

Mireya Urguidi, 22, pleaded yesterday with naturalization chief J. C. Stewart to extend her six-months visitor's visa. The permit expires in June.

She says a return to South America would mean marrying her father's friend—a man twice her age to whom she has been betrothed since birth. She did not give their names.

She told in a soft accent, her dark eyes often tearful, of a hurried departure from her Cochabamba, Bolivia, home in the midst of wedding preparations.

"I had told my father many times that I respected the man he had chosen for my husband, but that I didn't love him," Mireya said.

"My father wouldn't listen to me because it is the accepted custom of our family for the father to choose husbands for the daughters.

"I even pleaded with the man, who is a wealthy diplomat, to release me from our engagement, but he refused and said it could not be broken. He said I would have to marry him."

Mireya's mother, "more interested in my happiness than my marriage," gave her money to come to this country. The American consul suggested the home of an acquaintance in Tulsa.

"But my father will never forgive me and he says I cannot come home unless I marry his friend," the girl told Stewart.

Mireya said she was fearful her father may force her to return and she implored reporters to keep the name of her home town out of the newspapers.

Stewart suggested she enter the University of Tulsa, although already a college graduate, in order to obtain a student's visa for the duration of enrollment.

The immigration officer cautioned against a marriage of convenience so she could stay in the United States.

"Oh, no!" Mireya shook her head. "I would only marry for love. A marriage of convenience is what I am trying to escape."

**Man-Without-a-Country to Marry Willamina Woman**

Forty-five-year-old Hugo Vismapu told Gov. Douglas McKay Wednesday that he is a man without a country.

Laws concerning displaced persons being what they are, Vismapu told McKay, he will have no alternative after July 16 but to "seek domicile on another planet."

His impending marriage to another former Estonian, Linda Sider of Willamina, Ore., is threatened by the complicated situation in which he finds himself, Vismapu said.

**City to Help in Defense Set-up**

Mayor Robert L. Elfstrom and other city officials will confer in the next few days on selection of a supervisor for Salem's cooperation in the Oregon air raid warning and ground observation organization.

Governor Douglas McKay has written all Oregon mayors asking the cooperation of the cities and towns in the state network, and his letter reached Mayor Elfstrom Wednesday.

In addition to local supervisors the governor suggests location of observation posts in all communities.

A force of 6000 volunteer workers, 300 observation posts, four key warning points, and a filter center in Portland will be included in the Oregon set-up under the national reactivation of civilian defense requested by Louis A. Johnson, secretary of defense.

His fiancée summed up Vismapu's dilemma:

"Germany doesn't want him because the Estonian DP quota to the United States is exhausted for 100 years. He can't stay here after May 16. He would be ejected from Ireland July 16. And he is forbidden to go anywhere when he has to leave Ireland."

**Doctors Adopt Service Plan**

The Marion-Polk County Medical society is adopting a program whereby emergency calls at any time of night or day may be handled with the least delay possible.

The society has authorized the following statement:

"At the regular monthly meeting of the Marion-Polk County Medical society held April 11, 1950, the society unanimously adopted a program designed to lead to closed cooperation between the society and the general public. The medical society through its members, provides medical services to the people of Marion and Polk counties. It is our duty to provide these services to all, regardless of ability to pay.

"The society has the further duty to provide services at all times, including nights and weekends. The members of the society are organizing a program through which emergency calls at such times may be handled with the least possible delay.

Any person requiring medical care, who is unable to communicate with his physician may call 3-9187 in order to locate him. The personnel at this number will also provide the names of physicians willing to take emergency calls for those patients who have no local family physician."
