

Band Concert Wins Applause

The concert presented by some 130 young musicians, comprising the Salem high school and Willamette university bands, directed by E. Donald Jessup and Maurice W. Brennan, respectively drew wholehearted applause from a capacity audience Tuesday night in the high school auditorium.

The program was a varied one with widely contrasting numbers with the listeners greatly appreciating the work of the soloists as well as the selections played by the entire personnel of the two organizations.

Probably the high light of the evening was the playing of the "Piano Concerto in A Minor" by Grieg by Ann Gibbons, talented 17 year old high school musician. She displayed poise, brilliant technique and complete musicianship.

Don McMaster's rendition of "Piece en forme de Habanera" by Ravel was another outstanding part of the program. The arrangement was one that the young Willamette university musician produced.

Glenn B. E. trombonist with the high school band, did effective work in the solo "Andante al Allegro" by Baret Wayne Mercer, well known marimbist, gave evidence anew that he had mastered that instrument as he played the "Second Hungarian Rhapsody" by Liszt.

The combined bands were well received in their numbers "If Thou Be Near" and "Landingsing." Encores were those popular selections "National Emblem March" and "Stars and Stripes Forever."

Idaho Uranium Ore Promising

Washington, April 18 (AP)—The atomic energy commission regards as "promising" the recent discoveries of uranium-bearing ores in the Coeur d'Alene mining district of Idaho and near Marysville, Utah.

The Idaho finds were made in what is known as the "silver belt" in workings of the Sunshine Mine, famous lead-silver producer.

Commissioner Phillip L. Merritt, in an address prepared for delivery today in Toronto, called it "one of the most interesting recent discoveries of primary uranium ores in the United States."

He said the mining company has embarked on a comprehensive development program of drilling, clearing out caved workings and underground development to determine the radioactive zones and determine the commercial possibilities of the deposits.

The Marysville discovery was made early last year by Pratt Seegmiller on claims previously staked for fluorite. The most promising of these claims are now being developed by the Bullion-Monarch Mining Co., and the Vanadium Corporation of America.

The formation in which the uranium lies has been only meagerly prospected and Merritt said further work "may well reveal other interesting deposits."

Elfstrom Invited On Hawaiian Trip

Mayor Robert L. Elfstrom will be among a group of men from the northwest making a trip to Hawaii next month on one of the ships of the U.S. navy as guest of the navy.

Elfstrom, who received his invitation through the 13th Naval district commandant, is to report to San Diego April 30 and will leave for the islands from that city.

The return trip to the United States is to be made by air. Date of arrival in the states is May 12 with the plane to land in San Francisco.

Horseburger Arrest Made in Portland

Portland, April 18 (AP)—The state tried here today for another horseburger conviction, accusing the operator of a market east of Portland of selling the product to an unsuspecting public.

The state produced two employees of Talmadge F. Staley who testified they bought horse meat on Staley's order, and left

it in the cooler at Staley's market.

A laboratory technician testified hamburger from the market contained "protein from the horse species."

A restaurant owner arrested in a horseburger raid last year brought the original charge against Staley.

Brown's Cases Again Smashed

Dr. Harry A. Brown, Salem jeweler and optician, was convicted Tuesday that a window-smashing thief has learned the motto: Nothing succeeds like success.

Only Dr. Brown wishes the thief would try for success somewhere else—it costs him too much. For the third time in relatively recent months, the Liberty street show window of his jewelry store was caved in by a brick. The thief disappeared with 10 watches in loot.

The burglar alarm system was not in operation, but Brown said he had kept police advised of that fact. A 5 a.m. check Tuesday showed the store secure.

At 5:30 a.m. the glass had been broken and the watches taken. Prior to the Tuesday theft, the most recent smashing took place when an auto leaped the curb and smashed into the Court street window of the same establishment. Upon two other occasions, the Liberty street windows were smashed by thieves.

Jonnie Haan Ward Official

Jonnie Haan has arrived from Klamath Falls to take over as assistant manager at Montgomery Ward & Co. in Salem. He will be in charge of personnel and merchandising.

Pleased at the prospect of making his home in Salem, Haan describes the business possibilities here as "great . . . a very lively town."

He is a native of North Dakota, and it was at Minot that he first worked for Montgomery Ward, as a salesman in the men's clothing department. He went from there to Storm Lake, Iowa, where he continued working for the same company.

Haan first came to Oregon after his discharge from the army in 1945, rejoining Montgomery Ward at Corvallis. Since that time he has held various positions with the company at Centralia, Wash., Olympia, Wash., and Klamath Falls.

Funeral Held for George Sutherland

Lebanon, April 18—Funeral services were held at Scio for George Sutherland, a resident of Linn county for 92 years, and the last survivor of a family of 21 children.

The town of Sutherland was named for his family. Sutherland changed the spelling of his family name many years ago. He was born in Douglas county March 13, 1856.

He was an early teacher in Linn county and later became an ordained minister. He was also active in civic and political affairs throughout his later life.

Gas Company Has \$100 Pension Plan

Portland, April 18 (AP)—A \$100 monthly pension plan for 1130 employees of the Portland Gas & Coke company was announced by the firm here yesterday.

It will cover members of two unions, the chemical workers and the office employees. The plan includes social security benefits with pensions going to workers reaching 65 after 30 years' service.

C. H. Gueffroy, company president, said the firm would pay costs above workers' contributions to the social security fund. He estimated it would cost the company \$260,000 annually.

Pearson Attacks George Flagg

Eugene, April 18 (AP)—Walter Pearson, state treasurer and a democratic aspirant for governor came out here last night against (a) a sales tax and (b) George Flagg, public utilities commissioner.

Pearson told the Lane county democratic central committee he would veto any sales tax if he were elected governor.

Then he asserted, "George Flagg should be fired."

Flagg must go, he said, because he allowed two telephone rate increases in Oregon, and "juggled" rates for the benefit of a private power firm. He said Flagg allowed the firm to lower rates at The Dalles in order to meet competition of a People's Utility District, then allowed the same firm to raise rates in Portland.

Rabbi Gitlin on Democracy

"When God becomes persona non grata, totalitarianism inexorably follows," Rabbi Joseph Gitlin told Willamette university students at chapel Tuesday morning.

Speaking on "Judaism and Democracy," Rabbi Gitlin, who is from Temple Israel, Stockton, Calif., and represents the Jewish Chautauqua society, attempted to point out the similarity of ideals between Judaism and democracy, as well as between Christianity and democracy.

The similarity of ideals, he said, springs from the fact that the recognition of God is a prerequisite to freedom. "The God who brought us out of the house of bondage," the rabbi believes, "is essentially moral and essentially free, and therefore wants all people to be free."

"We should not look for God in heaven," he said, "but in and among men." The rabbi quoted Jesus, "Democracy is only possible as long as we believe in both God the father and Man the brother," he added.

Pointing out that early American government was based on three entities, God, the ruler, and the people, Rabbi Gitlin stated that "we cannot separate the concept of God from the concept of human reality, and that exaltation of a human makes man a mere puppet."

Kelly Owens Talks Against Hoover Plan

Kelly Owens, former state commander of the American Legion, gave the Legion's view of the Hoover commission reports Tuesday to members of the Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Owens summarized his views in a comment after his prepared speech by saying that "we don't want the veterans' administration dismembered without being consulted."

Nationally, the Legion is opposed to commission recommendations to alter insurance and hospital plans now conducted by the veterans' administration.

The national organization of the Junior Chamber is actively engaged in sponsoring adoption of all recommendations of the Hoover commission.

American Legion Objections Listed

Objectives and the record of the American Legion were the subject for a talk given at the Monday night meeting of Capital post No. 9, by the Oregon de-

partment commander, Sam Bowe.

Bowe, a World War II veteran from Grants Pass, commended the post for its continued high activity and membership rating among department posts. The drum and bugle corps of the post, which played during the evening, was invited by Bowe to be his departmental drill representative at the state convention in Grants Pass this summer.

Introducing Bowe was Gov. Douglas McKay, who in turn was introduced by Past Post Commander B. E. (Kelly) Owen. The commander's talk was preceded by the initiation of new members.

Judd Guesses 45,000 Voters

County Clerk Harlan A. Judd predicted 45,000 voters would be on the Marion county registration rolls by the 8 p.m. deadline Tuesday night.

As he made the forecast at noon, the line of registrants at the Marion county courthouse showed signs of tapering off from the last minute rush. The line along the counter of the third floor office has occasionally stretched down the stairway to the second floor.

And in the final rush to register, deputies from the clerk's office were dispatched to answer appeals at various points in the vicinity.

One was sent to Salem General hospital to register a woman who was in a cast and unable to appear at any of the county's 53 registration points.

Earlier in the day the same deputy had been sent to a residence on Chemawa road to register another bedfast citizen. Judd reported that he had been called to register a man who had been bedridden for five years.

The county clerk's estimate of the total 1950 registration was based on 1940 registration and the subsequent growth in population. He said that there were approximately 64,000 persons in Salem and Marion county who were entitled to register.

The 8 p.m. deadline Tuesday holds for all 53 registration points in the county.

Rigid Control For Spuds OK'd

Washington, April 18 (AP)—A rigid federal control program intended to end multi-million dollar government losses on surplus potatoes was approved 8 to 1 by the senate agriculture committee today.

One new feature was added to the tight controls and heavy penalties previously voted by an agriculture subcommittee.

Senator Ellender (D., La.) acting chairman, said the new provision would "give the secretary of agriculture the authority to cut back marketing quotas by areas or regions as much as 20 percent."

"This could be done even after the farmer complied with acreage limits and restrictions on the

bushels he could market, of the secretary found a surplus existed," he added.

Ellender said he voted against this provision. He said it was requested by the agriculture department and passed by Senator Anderson (D., N.M.), former secretary of agriculture.

Senator Holland (D., Fla.) reserved the right to oppose the bill on the senate floor.

Ellender said Majority Leader Lucas (D., Ill.) will decide when the senate will act.

Unless congress exacts and farmers accept some new system of controls, government price supports on potatoes will end with this year's crop.

Man Cleared of Killing Brother

Maynardville, Tenn., April 18 (AP)—A circuit court jury took only four minutes yesterday to acquit 33-year-old Carl Graves of the murder of his brother.

But Judge George Shepherd fined Carl \$50 and sentenced him to 30 days in jail for carrying a pistol.

Commented Judge Shepherd: "This killing won't stop as long as people carry pistols around."

Justice Belt in Diocese Group

Portland, April 18 (AP)—Five churches moved up in status in the 62nd annual convention of the Episcopal diocese in Oregon yesterday.

Trinity church at Ashland was admitted as a parish, automatically bringing the title of rector to the Rev. Aronah Mac Donnell, vicar there since 1942.

Four other churches were admitted as organized missions: St. Martin's, Lebanon; Church of the Holy Apostles, Multnomah; St. Andrew's, Springfield, and St. Luke's, Waldport.

The Rev. Hal R. Gross, Oregon City, was elected secretary of the convention; William B. Adams, Milwaukie, was reappointed chancellor of the diocese.

Among those named to the diocesan council was Robert Wayne Smith, Corvallis. Among lay members elected to the

standing committee was Justice Harry H. Belt, Salem.
